

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### CUT HEADS OFF DANDELIONS BEFORE THEY GO TO SEED

A gentleman who is especially interested in horticultural matters and the beautifying of the town, suggested to The Advance this week that special note be made asking all to see that dandelions on their lawns or in their yards do not go to seed. ### ANCIENT TRADITION SAID TO HAVE CAUSED TROUBLE

"Forty-Man" Law Alleged to Have Been Invoked in the Abitibi District in Quebec

Stories to the effect that there were riots threatened recently in the town of Senneterre, Quebec, have been current recently, and the cause of the trouble is an odd one. Senneterre is in the Abitibi section of Quebec and is a town frequented by lumberjacks on their way to and from the woods. According to the reports, a group of lumbermen came out of the woods to Senneterre, claiming that their contract had been broken. The men gathered at Senneterre and when officers of the law tried to get them to observe certain rules and regulations necessary in towns the lumberjacks quoted in reply what they insisted was an old law of Quebec, in force for centuries, "that 40 men, grouped, and having the same view, or the same object, make law."

In discussing the matter a despatch from Montreal last week says:—

"In what dim age was this 'law' born; in what circumstances; and how was it transplanted in New France to be handed from generation to generation even to the 20th century? Such is the question now occupying E. Z. Massicotte, court house archivist, who has before him data proving that the tradition has been widespread in the remote areas of this province.

"The Senneterre incident came a week or two ago. It was based on complaints from lumbermen that their contract had not been followed. Coming out of the bush, they united at Senneterre, and, for a time, there was an ugly situation in the little Abitibi town. Officers of the law were summoned, together with officials from the department of lands and forests at Quebec. The would-be rioters were soon told that execution of plans for making trouble would be quickly checked, according to the laws of the land. Then came the occurrence which has raised the question of the origin of the old '40-man law.'

"One of the government officials from Quebec has written to Mr. Massicotte as follows: 'I heard it affirmed by some of the men at Senneterre that 40 men, grouped and having the same view or the same object, make law. In around 50 years, this is the third time that the same affirmation, to my knowledge, has been made. I have known of it around 1880 at St. Elie de Caxton (St. Maurice county); in 1918 at Grande Bale, Lake St. John, and now in 1929 at Senneterre, Abitibi.

"I questioned those people, and they know nothing of the origin of the pretension, but their contention is that 40 men have all privileges and all powers. One of them told me that his father had said this dated from the time of the knights of old France, who used this law to impose their views on their sovereign."

"That is all the information Mr. Massicotte now has before him. In commencing his research, however, various suggestions have been made to him. That the tradition, or 'law,' is European in origin is taken as beyond question. Whether it is a relic of the days when each province in France had its own 'coutume,' or code of laws; or whether it came from Britain in pre-feudal days or feudal days; whether it is a fragment of written or unwritten law, are all matters to be threshed out. And, as for the birth of the 'law' on this side of the Atlantic, search much be made to determine whether it came with the pioneers of New France, or whether it is one of those clauses of the unwritten 'bush law' and study must be made to decide the possibility of its having possibly been transmitted to the old voyageurs by Scots traders, or by other Europeans of the early days."

### LOOKING AFTER OLD AND NEGLECTED CEMETERIES

In an editorial last week The Toronto Mail and Empire says:—"Burial grounds in many parts of Ontario have been allowed to fall into neglect and decay and in some cases the remains have become exposed through the action of the weather. Their condition may be no reflection on those living in the neighborhood, for the relatives of the dead may have moved away. But it is repugnant to the sense of respect for the dead, and in some localities disinterested efforts have been made to put them again into a decent state of repair. These efforts, however, have been isolated and there is need for some central authority to take the work in hand. The department of health has appointed Dr. McCullough to make a thorough investigation and to report upon the cemeteries of the province, particularly the old and neglected ones, with a view to improving the situation. A bad case is reported from Tincap, five miles north of Brockville, on the Smiths Falls highway. This cemetery was established in the early days of settlement and contains the remains of many of the pioneers in that district, but it was abandoned for purposes of interment nearly half a century ago. The department of health, while making its investigations, might well pick up the local history in which cemeteries abound. Even a record of the inscriptions on the tombstones would be welcome to historical societies, which then could delve deeper into the past. The pioneers of this province were a fine race and it is fitting that the people of to-day should, where it is necessary, look more carefully after the places where they were buried."

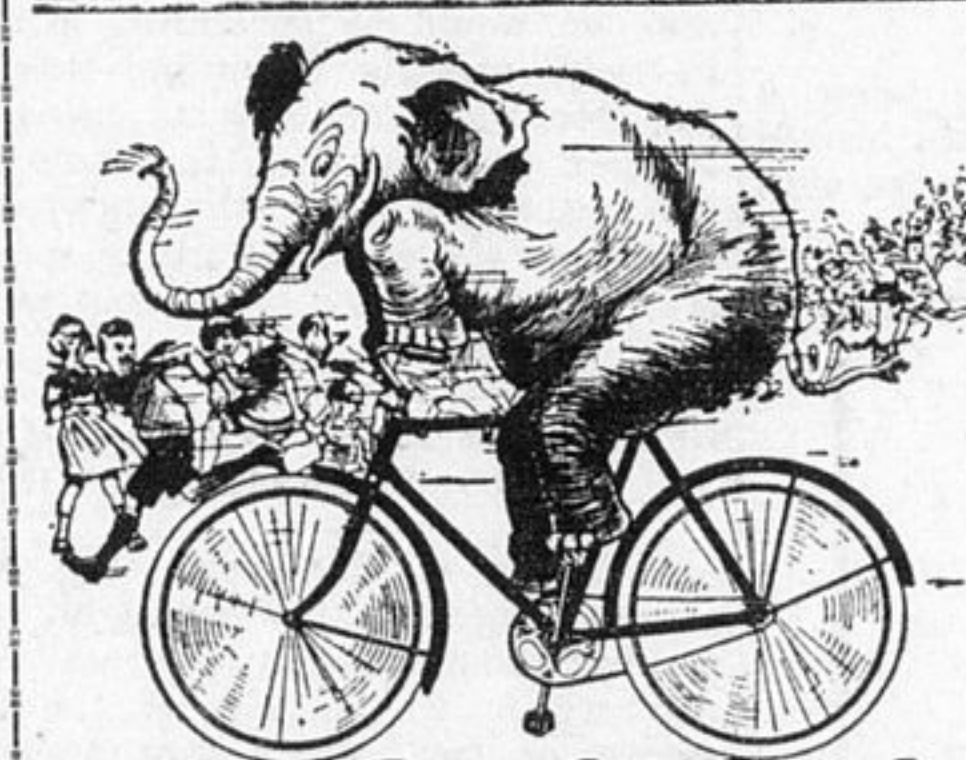
