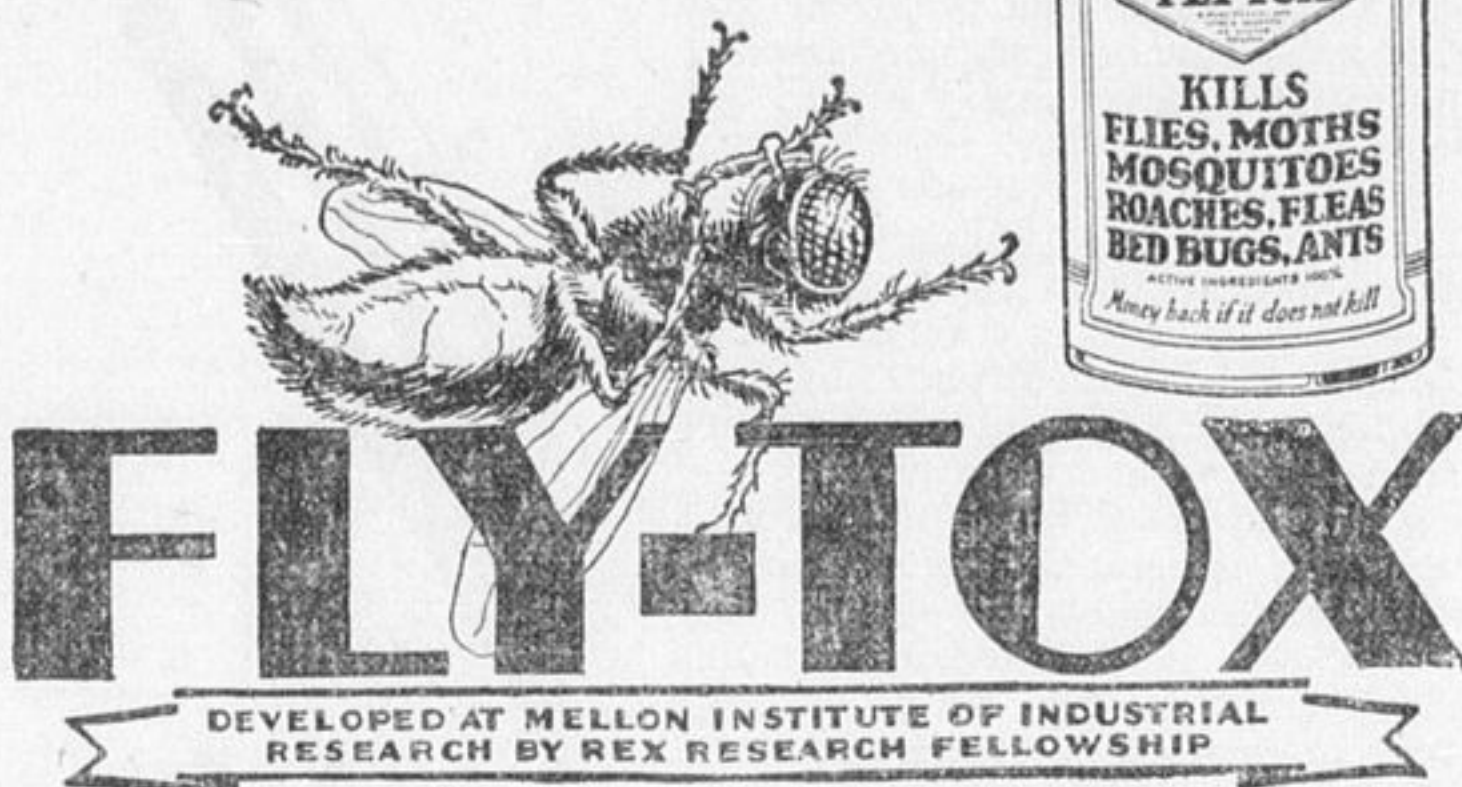

A resident on the Holytex was present asking that a few loads of rock be put on their road as the families resident there and on the Pleanum owned their own homes and were tax payers. Although the petitioner had the consent of a McIntyre official for the council to do the work at present, it was remembered that six or seven years ago this mine had stopped Tisdale council making any repairs to the road to the Holytex. Some charity cases were reported as not needing further help. Others were wanting it. This presents a vast problem to the council for while not wanting to have needless suffering caused, they must be fair to the taxpayer. South Porcupine has gone along quietly for six months or so without the customary twins arriving to augment its population. Now comes the latest. Tisdale council has twins—at the Timmins hospital. Both doing well. A short time ago a case in Moneta was reported to them and help asked for a family where the husband had been sick and the wife was a semi-invalid. The twin infants were badly in need of hospital attention, so the council sanctioned of their being taken to Timmins hospital. When an investigator was sent to have the father come to Monday's meeting the most that could be learned was that the family had moved to Red Lake and had either sold or rented their house. A phone call to the hospital revealed the fact that the twins were still there in the charge of Tisdale council. It is thought that when the father gets on his feet his intention is to claim his twins but at present all that seems to be definitely known is that the council have the twins. It was decided to get some calcium chloride for the places on the road where the dust was the worse menace. C. 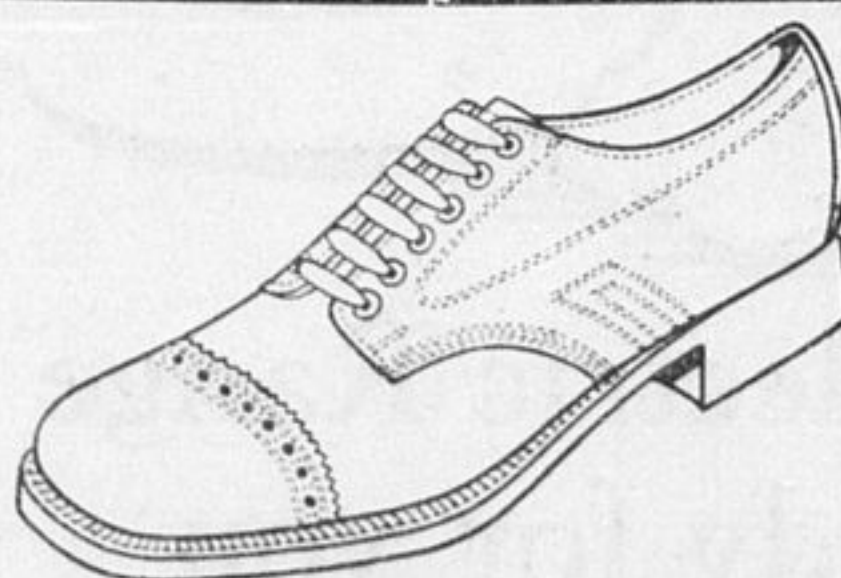
