## GRAVEL AND SAND—AND PLACER

Although this is supposed to be the age of the motor car there are a surprisingly large number of people who use the modern type of bicycle. The Advance is inclined to believe that the revival of the use of bicycles is connected with the extensive advertising campaigns carried on in recent years to popularize bicycles. Some years ago when bicycling was at the height of its popularity the firms manufacturing bicycles decided to discontinue all advertising. They evidently thought that the bicycle was so popular that it needed no advertising. In an incredibly short time, however, the bicycles disappeared from popular favour and it is only recently that they have returned to anything like common use. In Timmins and district there are the usual number of boys using bicycles for pleasure, and in addition many men working at the mines find bicycles very convenient for riding to and from work. As a result there are large numbers of bicycles in use here. Recently there has been an epidemic of the theft of bicycles. The plan seems to be to steal two or three bicycles, take them apart, and then reassemble them in a way that disguises their identity, so that it is almost impossible to recognize the stolen property. The police have had much difficulty through this criminal plan, and Chief McLaughlin suggests a method to overcome all this. His idea is to license every bicycle, charging only a nominal fee, the purpose being to assist identification and not to make revenue. Under this plan every bicycle would have a license plate and full description of the make and parts of the wheel would be kept so that the present method of changing parts from different stolen wheels would not be possible. The plan appears to be well worth trying, as the practice of stealing bicycles and disguising them by changing parts has become so great a nuisance and cause of loss that something should be done about it.

A recent change in the matter of police court costs appears to be burdensome and tending to all sorts of evils. This is the regulation by which a fee of five dollars for each case is imposed for crown counsel fees. Under the present regulation this five dollar fee is imposed whether a plea of guilty is entered or not. There is no way for the accused person to escape this five dollar penalty. As a consequence of the new regulation the costs for a minor offence will total eleven times the amount of the fine imposed. When costs become so burdensome there is inevitably a tendency to lower the efficiency of the enforcement of the law. Court costs were high enough before this new regulation was put in force. The Government should at least see that these exorbitant costs are not imposed when the crown is not put to the expense of a trial.

The recent visit of Mr. W. E. N. Sinclair, leader of the Liberal party in Ontario to the North Country has apparently loosed a flood of criticism of the Government in regard to the usage given the North Land. Mr. Sinclair is in position to promise 'high, wide and handsome,' as to what he may do if and when and how he gets in power. Nothing that Mr. Sinclair may promise, however, in his most generous moments, will equal the promises of the Farmers' Government, for example. In considering what others promise, it is indeed well to remember what the Ferguson Government has actually done for the North. The Ferguson highway is one of the undeniable evidences of the Government's interest in the North. The increase in the amount of royalty paid the municipalities is another. The insistence of the Government that the settlers should be paid the amounts due them from the Mattagami Pulp and Paper Co. is still another proof that the Government has tried to look after the interests of the North. Many roads have been

built for settlers and to open up new country. The inauguration of the correspondence courses for the education of the children of settlers and others who otherwise could not have hoped for educational advantages should alone guarantee a kindly thought from the people of the North for the present administration. The Advance believes that there is much that the Government should have done. Innumerable new roads are needed for the settlers. The settlers need assistance in many ways. The Advance believes that what is needed will eventually be secured. It will not help, however, in the securing of other needed improvements to pretend that the Government has done nothing, or to forget the many times in which the Government has helped cheerfully and effectively in the progress of the North. It is admitted that there are many matters waiting the attention and action of the Government, but it should also be admitted that the Government has done well indeed. Such an admission only increases the hope that the Government will do still better by the North.

While no definite official announcement has been made in regard to the proposed railway from Timmins to Kamiskotia, there is a general feeling of hopefulness that the work will be undertaken at an early date. This was the impression gathered by Mayor Drew after the deputation had interviewed Premier Ferguson in the matter. It is expected that an official announcement will be made in the next week or two. In the meantime there seems to be general confidence among those who are in close touch with the situation that the railway will be built at an early date. If this is the fact, and there is reason to believe it is, there will be general advantage, not only to Timmins but to the whole district. Few persons have questioned the desirability of the railway extension to Kamiskotia, though there has been question as to who should stand any risk as to loss that might result from its construction and operation. Years ago when the T. & N. O. was extended to the Porcupine camp the Hollinger Mine subscribed to a guarantee bond, but was never called upon to pay anything on this account. There is a general belief that the same condition would be true about the railway to Kamiskotia—that it would create enough business to be a paying venture. As President W. C. Langdon of the Timmins board of trade emphasized in his interview with the premier, not only is there a very promising mineral area to be developed, but vast areas of timber will be made available for use, not only creating business and traffic, but also directly benefitting the Government in the way of additional timber dues. The opening up of the Kamiskotia area will benefit the North and this will be of advantage to all Ontario. The line can not be built too soon to please the majority of people. At the same time those who fairly consider the matter will agree that Hon. Mr. Ferguson in this case is right,—as he usually is,—when he points out that no action should be taken until all phases of the question are carefully considered, because the money to be spent is that of the people of Ontario for whom the premier is acting as trustee.

Mr. A. LaPrairie, more familiarly known as "Lap" has won fame in this district in many lines. As manager and moving spirit in the now-famous Timmins Charity Turkey Stag, "Lap" will not soon be forgotten. As manager of the excellent boxing bouts recently presented in Timmins he has won almost equal high reputation on the merit of the events. This week The Advance was informed that Mr. LaPrairie is deserving of recognition in another line of public service—that of life-saving at the Mattagami river. Twice last week he rescued youngsters from the river when the children were in grave danger of being drowned. One girl of twelve was going down for the third time when "Lap" saw the youngster was in difficulties and went to her assistance, encouraging and advising her until he could swim out to her, and then safely bringing her to land and getting her promptly home and cared for. A similar service was given to a young boy a day or two before. The previous years the same sort of service has been given by Mr. LaPrairie. The Advance makes mention of these good deeds at the solicitation of people who know about them and appreciate the coolness, skill, speedy action and good spirit that make the rescues possible. This is one occasion, however, when "Lap" himself will give no assistance. Ask him about the Charity Stag or a boxing bout and he is a regular mine of information. Ask him about his rescues from the river and he is a veritable clam. "Now, don't say anything about it!" was the most that could be pried out of "Lap" in this case. And this makes still another record for "Lap!"
