CROSSCUTTING TOWARD THE VEIN AT THE HARKER MINE

At the Harker Mine, in the Ramore district work is going along satisfactorily, and it is felt that within a very short time the work will be advanced sufficiently to indicate just what the property may be. According to recent word from the Harker, encouraging mineralization was encountered in the upper horizons. A small part could be classified as ore, and a considerable tonnage could be included as low grade ore in event of the mine being developed successfully at depth. However, summed up, these results at upper levels are just a little short of what would be required to establish a profitable mine—hence the desire to find out if an increase in mineralization occurs at greater depth. Toward this end, the shaft was continued to 1,000 feet in depth, which point was recently reached. The crosscut is now moving toward the vein and a campaign of drifting along the fracture is intended to render a final verdict some time before the end of September.

Tisdale township council met for their regular session on Monday evening with Reeve Gallagher and Councillor Williams, Kerr and Laforest present. Several were in attendance re taxes and assessment. G. Colombo asked for a reduction on the Empire theatre. Considerable time was taken up with a re-adjustment of the assessment of some blocks in the Bartleman townsite on the points most extremely distant from Timmins. The assessment as it stood, was based on values at a time when real estate in and around Timmins was at a high-water mark. Some of this property was territory annexed to Timmins, but Tisdale was to hand over to them their complete assessment roll, hence it was their council had to handle this matter. Mr. Bartleman has made efforts to have these blocks turned back to acreage but owing to the government lots this cannot very readily be made. Mr. Gordon Gauthier, lawyer, of Timmins, was present on behalf of the Porcupine United Mines re arrears of taxes. The taxes on the Rochester claims of this property were paid up to date but there were some \$7900 of taxes due on other groups of claims in the township. It was arranged that this might be paid in three instalments, two months apart, if the present year's taxes were kept paid up to date. The Porcupine United Mines are at present a going concern, having turned out their largest gold brick in the last two weeks that it has handled since its existence. Hence though there are not chattels on the claims on which the arrears are due the capital wealth of the company was considered a sufficient guarantee to allow these arrears to be paid by instalments.

A man from Schumacher was present re overcharge for his water connection. He was not there when the workmen went to put in his connection so his wife directed them where it was wanted.
