### Another Tribute Paid the Late John Vanier

In the last issue of "Abitibi," the monthly magazine issued for the employees of the Abitibi Power and Paper Co., the editor, Alec M. Dewar, pays the following tribute to the late John Vanier of Iroquois Falls:—

"In the death of John Vanier of Iroquois Falls the Town, the Abitibi Organization and the whole province lost a valuable man. Mr. Vanier was a faithful and skilled employee of the company, but he was a great deal more than that. He was very active in the ranks of organized labor. He was strong for the interests of the employees but he also appreciated the position of the company in the competitive market and while not giving up his stand for the best available conditions for the workmen always took a reasonable attitude and was always willing to listen to both sides of any question that came up. His open-mindedness in this respect was one of the things that gained more for the men than anything else. In labour Mr. Vanier was known not only in his own community but throughout the whole industry and was prominent in International labour circles. Mr. Vanier was more even than an outstanding union man. He had a wealth of sympathy for his fellows which led him to be a booster for everything of interest to the community and district in which he was living. There was no question of public interest which came up that he did not study thoroughly and then used all his splendid energy to work out a satisfactory solution. His work in connection with the Local Board of Trade of which he had just been again elected president before his death and also in connection with the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade which took in the districts of Temiskaming, Cochrane and Nipissing was of great value to all that part of the country. He was one of the men who fought steadily and long for the Ferguson Highway and for settlers' roads in that district. His name will be remembered for a long time and his memory cherished for his many good works in connection with community and district affairs. The sincerest sympathy of everyone in the organization goes out to Mrs. Vanier and her family in this, their hour of great sorrow."

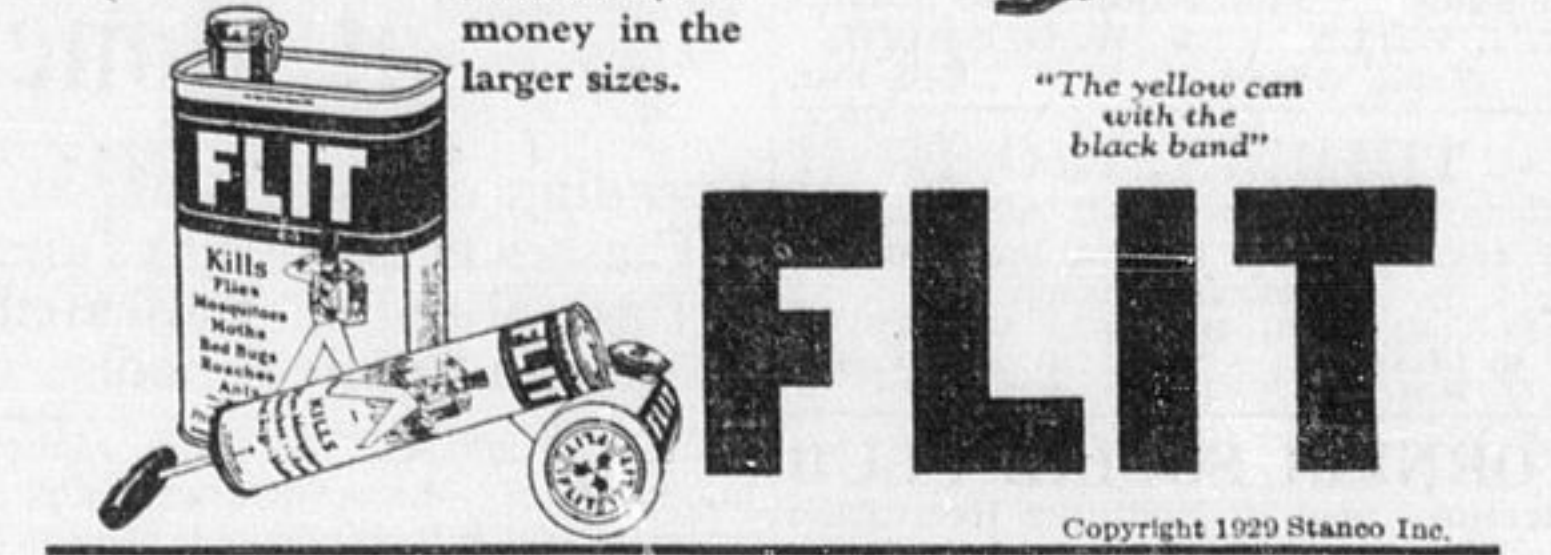

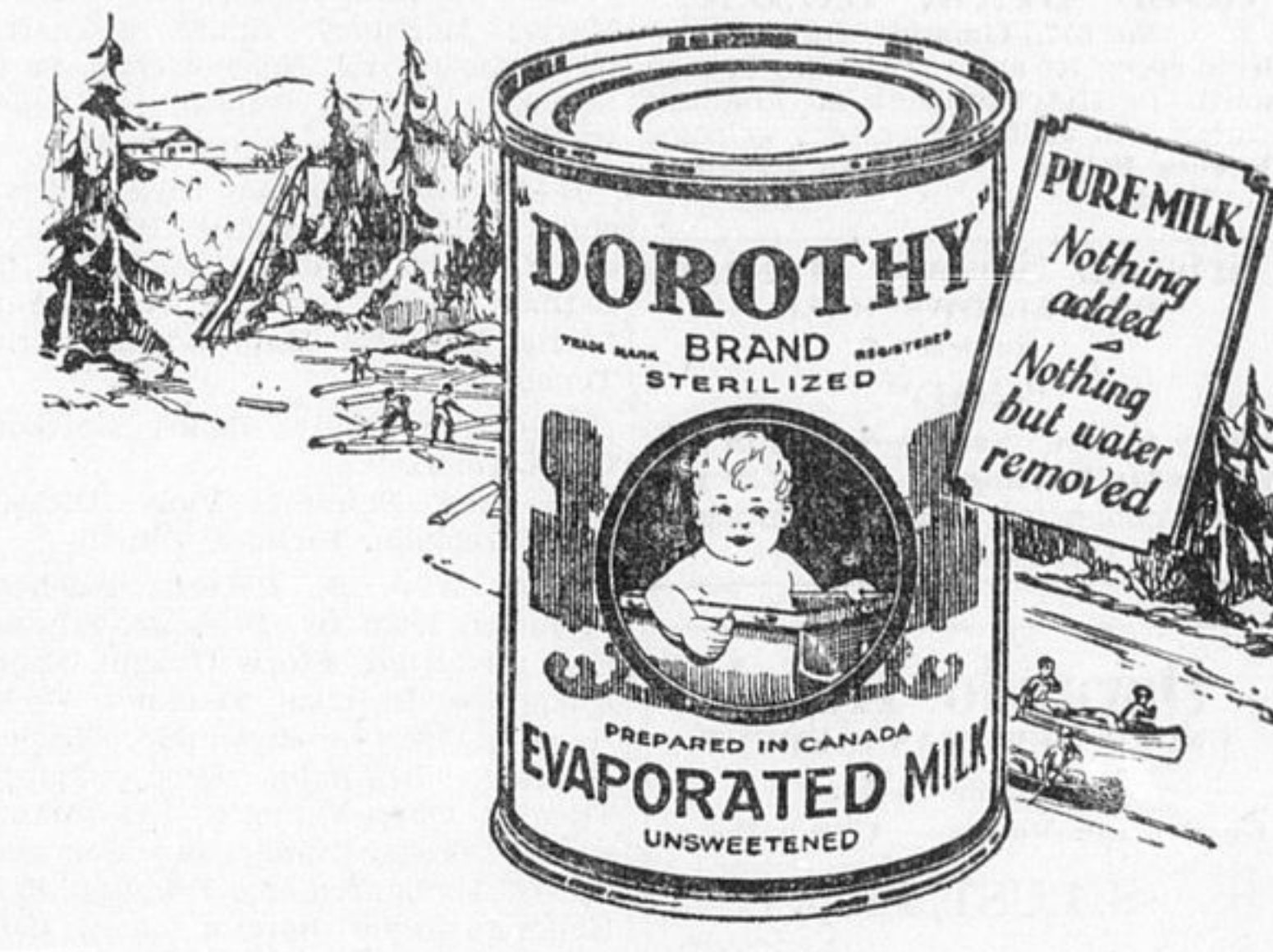

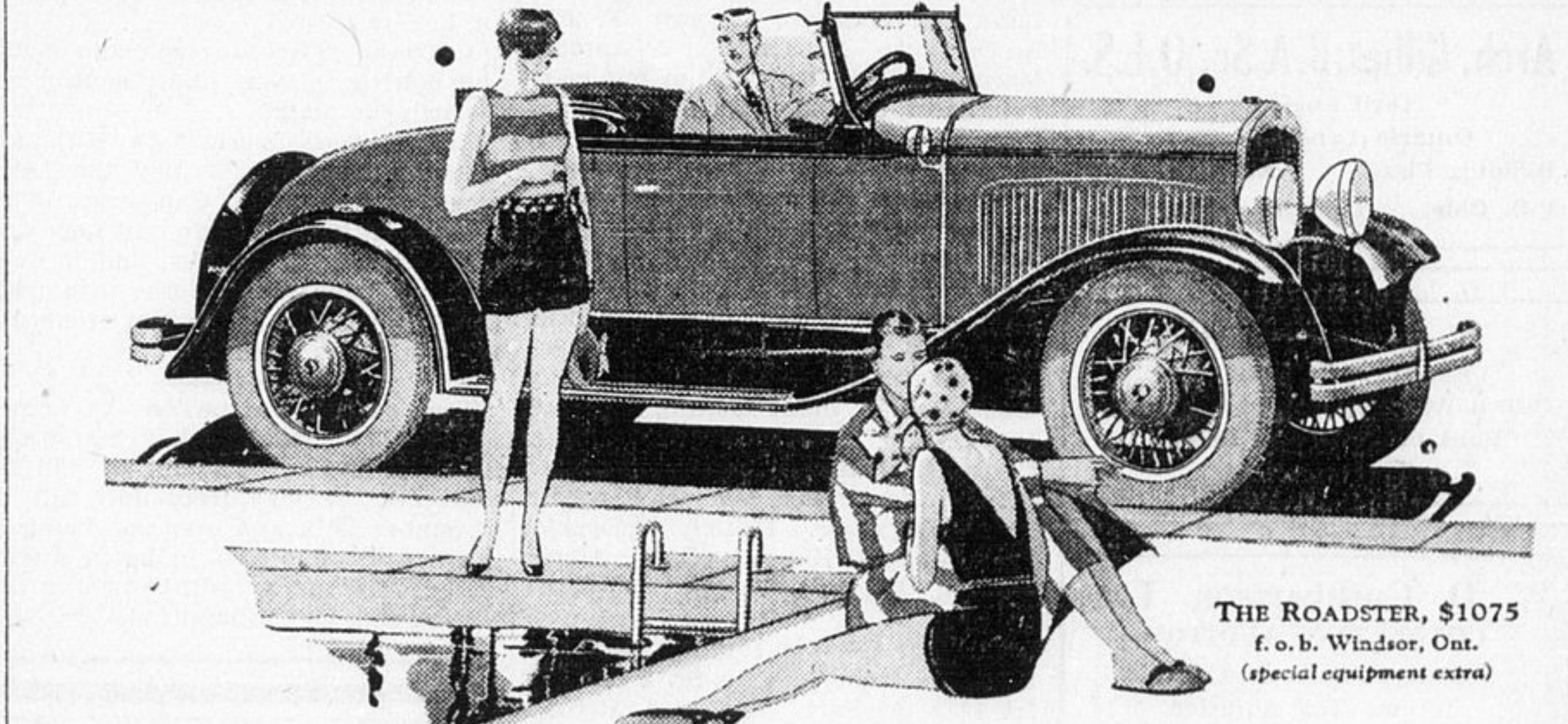
