ASKS FOR SQUARE DEAL FOR THE MAN OVER FORTY YEARS

Complains That Big Industries Discriminate Against Men Over 40, And Asks for a Solution.

The Advance this week received the following "open letter" for publication: Timmins, Ont., July 31st, 1929

Dear Sir:—After reading some articles in your newspaper, The Porcupine Advance, of July 25th, about the Associated Boards again intending to discuss insurance and also about the proceedings at the council meeting, we came to another discussion.

It was very pleasant news, indeed, to hear that the Old Age pension had become a matter of fact. It was also interesting to read about the efforts to be made to lower our fire insurance rates.

As a black cloud in that sunshine came the news out of our midst. People over forty years of age have nearly no chance any more to get work around Timmins, Kapuskasing, Smooth Rock Falls, Iroquois Falls, etc., with the bigger companies.

Here was our point of discussion:—With all the appreciation for the painstaking troubles to enlighten us with pensions for people over seventy, and, perhaps, lower insurance, we want to know yet how will we succeed in our striving to settle our families, educate our children, pay our duties, when at the most difficult and most responsible age of forty and higher, our means of making money are taken away?

Dear editor, here we want your advice and help. A newspaper being a public organ reaches more people and wider circles than a meeting can do and most brings quicker results.

Where this matter concerns a great part of the population of Timmins and Northern Canada, and also immediately the interests of the town, we would kindly ask you to give this open letter a place in your paper and give us your advice.

Yours most truly, "Some of Your Subscribers from Forty Till Seventy Years of Age." In reply to this letter The Advance would say that about the only advice this paper can give in the matter is to suggest continued publicity for the idea, so that public opinion may be aroused to a realization of the matter and to seek a remedy.

BYERS TOWNSHIP CLAIMS APPEAR VERY PROMISING

T. A. Jamieson has had Very Pleasing Results from Work on Gold Prospects

T. A. Jamieson, a brother of Geo. Jamieson of Kamiskotia fame, was in town last week on business and had samples with him that would seem to indicate that T. A. has found an important gold property in the Kamiskotia district. He has 14 claims in the township of Byers, about ten miles from the Hollinger's Kamiskotia properties. The Byers claims are gold ones and Mr. Jamieson's many samples from the property suggested that there is the right geology and formation with every chance of making a big mine.

Mr. Jamieson has a large number of samples and there was not a blank among them, though they were picked at random. He has taken them to the Dept. of Mines at Toronto for study there of the geology and other indications. Considerable work has been done on the T. A.
