Whereas Cochrane is in direct line on the Northern circle air route of the intended commercial air flights via Greenland and Iceland between the industrial centres of the United States and Central Europe;

And whereas the relative position of Cochrane for airflights to and from the camp. all large cities of the Dominion of Canada and the United States is the same as Reykjavik, Iceland, holds for the cities of Europe and this must necessarily develop Cochrane into the east- legs, won't wrinkle or slip down. ern_terminus of the Northern Circle

And whereas Cochrane now has a runway which has been found imminently satisfactory for landing and taking off of land planes as demonstrated during last year's trial flight over the Northern Circile Route;

And where Lake Lillabelle, just north of the town limits of Cochrane, is admirably fitted as an air station for seaplanes and has been and is now being continuously used by the General Air- patch was within a couple of miles ways planes in their commercial flights from Haileybury. between Amos and Cochrane and to and from James Bay;

And whereas the Chicago Tribune announced right along that their plane, making a trial trip over the Northern Circle route last week, would refuel at Cochrane, coming up from Sault Ste Marie and only in the last minute changed the route to refuel at Remi Lake, being persuaded, according to press inferences, to this effect by Ontario Government officials;

And whereas Remi Lake air station, of the Ontario Government Flying Patrol is most unsuitable for any commercial route, being inaccessible and cannot, in the least, be compared with Lillabelle Lake as a refuelling station; Therefore be it resolved that the Municipal Council of the Town of Cochrane respectfully request the Ontario Government to make investigation why the Town of Cochrane was thus sidetracked and on whose advice the route was changed from Cochran to Remi Lake and to prevent a recurrence of sidetracking Cochrane for future flights;

And be it further resolved that copy of this resolution be forwarded to Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Premier of Ontario and also to the daily press so as to insure the suitability and safety of Cochrane as an airport.
