#### ARSON CHARGE AT KIRKLAND LAKE DISMISSED IN COURT

Some days ago Paul Beaulieu was charged at Kirkland Lake police court with arson in connection with a fire at the residence occupied by the accused. Fire Chief Matheson, of Kirkland Lake, was one of the chief witnesses for the prosecution. He told of being called to a fire at Beaulieu's house about 2.25 on the morning of the 17th of July. Shortly after the arrival of the brigade there had been a flash which sent the flame about 75 feet in the air. The fire was under control in about an hour. On entering the building afterwards the fire chief said he found a four-gallon can burned with the top ripped open. In another room he had found another can of gasoline mixed with water. The water had apparently gotten in during the fighting of the fire. Mr. Hunt, for the defence, questioned the chief closely as to whether the stuff was gasoline or coal oil. The chief was sure it was gasoline, but he had not had it analyzed. The township clerk gave evidence as to a statement signed by Beaulieu. It was admitted that the accused was not warned before the statement was taken. Evidence was given by the owner of a gas station in regard to four gallons of gas sold to the accused on the evening of July 16th. While considering that some of the circumstances of the case looked highly suspicious, the magistrate pointed out that the Crown had to present evidence directly connecting the accused with the offence with which he was charged, and this had not been done, so that there was nothing else to do than to dismiss the charge.

#### ONTARIO GOLD MINES ARE MAKING NEW HIGH RECORD

Production of gold from the mines of Ontario is on the increase again, following the temporary falling off in 1928. All indications point toward a new high record being established during the current year.

Production up to the end of July shows an increase of between \$500,000 and \$600,000, according to preliminary estimates prepared for The Mail and Empire, and if this rate can be maintained the high production of \$3,627,000 established in 1927, will be exceeded this year.

Very important contributors to the increase now being recorded are Lake Shore at Kirkland Lake and Dome Mines at Porcupine.

The mines of Porcupine district have produced approximately \$239,000,000 up to this time of writing, and with upwards of \$56,000,000 from the mines of Kirkland Lake.

Total production of gold from Ontario mines for all time has reached an aggregate of approximately \$293,000,000.—Toronto Mail and Empire.

#### THINKS THEY HAVE FOUND ANCIENT MINE IN ALGOMA

Algoma is chiefly noted for its tame wolves, but last week Algoma was in the limelight because a Sault Ste. Marie man was reported to have found an ancient cave in the Grosseau area near the Sault, it being believed that this cave might be a sample of ancient mining work done in the district. The entrance to this cave had been long concealed by shrubbery and debris. From a thorough investigation and exploration of the cave it is believed that many articles and much information relative to the earlier history of Algoma will be produced.

According to the despatches from Sault Ste. Marie, the cave was discovered by W. E. Gagnon of the Sault, who was on a berry-picking expedition with his family among the Grosseau hills. He stumbled upon it by accident and an investigation showed it was quite deep and broad.

Having no light with him and fearing that the cave might develop into mine workings done by natives hundreds of years ago, Gagnon did not pursue his investigations at the time, but the cave will be carefully examined by a party properly equipped, to see what it holds. Gagnon said that after he had removed the rocks and debris from the mouth of the cave he found it large enough to drive an auto into and that it was symmetrically formed.

#### HILL-CLARK-FRANCIS HAVE CONTRACT FOR LISKEARD RINK

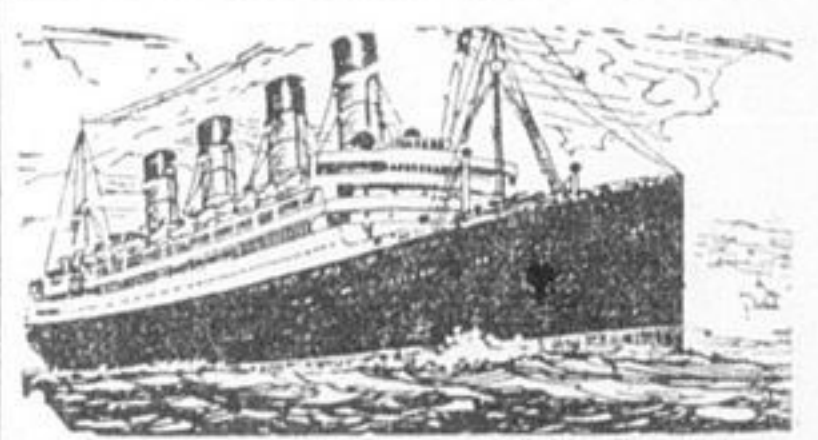
The New Liskeard Speaker last week says:—

"On Tuesday of this week the contract for the erection of the six-sheet curling rink for the New Liskeard curlers was closed with Messrs. Hill-Clark-Francis, Ltd. The committee in charge have made first-class financial arrangements for the building of this monster rink which will be the largest of its kind in this part of the Northland. The structure will have immense steel spans over four of the sheets, while the other two will be built to one side, thus leaving room for additional space on the other side should space ever be needed. An up-to-date club room will run across the end of the main building and everything possible will be done to give the curlers comfortable quarters for both curling and social intercourse. The building will be rushed to completion with the dispatch for which this contracting firm is noted, and should be available for the fall fair of the New Liskeard Agricultural Society to be held early in October. Congratulations should be extended to the committee having this work in hand for the success of their efforts to secure the necessary funds.

#### AUTOMOBILE FATALITIES MAKING ACUTE PROBLEM

"The automobile fatality problem is becoming more acute every year in Canada; the death rate has almost doubled in the last two years."  
Such is the statement which has just been made by Doctor Louis I. Dublin, Chief Statistician of the Metropolitan Life. The figures given are as follows: In 1927, the automobile accident death rate in Canada was 4.3 per 100,000; in 1928, it was 5.8; in 1929, it was 8.4.  
The province of Ontario is the lead in the high rate of automobile fatalities, and is closely followed by the province of Quebec.  
During the month of June of the present year, automobile fatalities have reached an unusually high rate in the provinces of Ontario and Quebec; in the former it was 18.0 per 100,000 and in the latter 16.6 per 100,000.

#### DATE OF TIMMINS CIVIC HOLIDAY NOT ANNOUNCED

This week The Advance received literally scores of enquiries as to the date of the civic holiday for Timmins this year. Some enquiries were determined that it would on Monday. "All the towns are having civic holiday on Monday this year," one man insisted. Of course, this is not the fact. As the name itself implies "civic holiday" is set at the pleasure of the individual municipality and has nothing whatever to do with any other municipality. It is true, of course, that some of the Central Temiskaming towns, being near neighbours, this year agreed to have their civic holiday on Monday, Aug. 5th, but this was only a matter of agreement between towns very closely allied in such matters.  
Others were equally emphatic in asserting that the Timmins civic holiday this year was Wednesday, Aug. 7th. This also was wrong.  
As a matter of fact the Timmins town council has not as yet decided upon any date for a civic holiday, nor has the mayor made any proclamation in the matter. At the last meeting of the town council the matter was referred to but action was deferred until the next meeting, when the mayor would be home again from his vacation. Until the council and mayor select a date and the proclamation is duly made there can be no legal civic holiday. On Monday next, no doubt the council will select the date for this year's civic holiday for Timmins.  
In the meantime it may be noted that if any considerable number of people desire any special day set aside as the civic holiday it is quite in order to approach the council in the matter. In some past years the civic holiday was dated to coincide with the regatta put on by the Timmins Citizens' Band. In other years it was chosen to allow all the opportunity to attend the Oddfellows' picnic at Golden City. The council always showed the utmost readiness to have the civic holiday on a day acceptable to any large proportion of the people.

Mr. and Mrs. H. See returned last week from an extended motor trip in the south. They found the Ferguson highway compared very favourably with the ordinary roads in the south and think the complaints about the condition of the road at present not justified as they found the road in the North to be very good. In view of the fact that on their return here they planned another extended motor trip to the south is proof that the condition of the North Land roads at the present time is satisfactory.
