**GOVERNMENTS CO-OPERATE  
ON FOREST WASTE PROBLEM**

The Canada Lumberman in its current issue says:—"The most significant feature of the recent Forestry Conference in Ottawa was the willingness of the Federal and Provincial Governments to co-operate on a plan of conserving our natural resources. Authorities are by no means agreed as to the duration of Canadian forests, even at the present rate of cutting, although there is plenty of data to show an urgent need of measures to conserve our forest wealth. There will probably be a diversity of opinion as to what form these measures should take, but the Governments, with the aid of those who have made this subject a lifelong study, should be able to formulate plans of a practical character to meet the needs of the situation. The lumber, pulp and paper, and woodworking industries are vitally interested in the conservation of their raw materials; diminution of the supplies will involve a serious reduction in the activities of these industries and

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a huge loss of capital. The people take but a passing interest in the matter, because notwithstanding the many articles on the subject, it is not a matter with which they are in close contact. At present it does not directly touch their pockets. Should however, forest wealth diminish very seriously, the public will awaken to the fact that many Canadian industries are affected to such an extent as to raise the prices of lumber, paper and other articles. Advance in prices is the surest method of compelling attention to a subject. The Governments have taken action none too soon; some indeed are of opinion that they the years behindhand, and in one respect, that of taking an inventory, they are wasting both time and money, because sufficient information is available to warrant immediate steps to prevent what some regard as destructive methods of using the forests. The aim of the Governments is obviously not to retard the proper use of the forests—because the non-utilization of these involves their ultimate destruction by fires, insects and fungi—but the adoption of such measures as will result in a perpetual supply of forest wealth.

**SOME GOOD BOXING BOUTS  
AT THE RINK LAST NIGHT**

Lefty Trumble vs. Pete Yawney and Kid Hamilton vs. Gabrielchuk Were Particularly Good

The boxing bouts at the Timmins skating rink last night attracted a crowd of some five hundred fight fans and some good bouts were staged. The event was in the nature of a return match, as it were, with Kirkland Lake boxing talent, and once more the Timmins boxers showed up well.

The first bout was between Short, of Kirkland Lake, and "Frenchy" Leonard Morris, of Timmins. "Frenchy" outclassed his opponent and knocked him out in the second round, but it was a lively affair while it lasted.

One of the best bouts of the evening was the bout between Pete Yawney, of Kirkland Lake, and "Lefty" Trumble of Timmins. Trumble showed class and action and demonstrated his ability as a boxer. Yawney put up a clever battle, but the decision properly went to Trumble on his work for the evening.

Probably the most popular bout of the evening was the contest between Kid Roy Hamilton and Chester Gabrielchuk. The crowd felt that this was the evening's best bout. Both lads gave all they had, and they had a lot. Hamilton did the leading throughout and added to his growing reputation as a boxer of outstanding ability. He won the decision for the bout without question.

The feature bout of the night between Kid Williams, of Kirkland Lake, and Mickey Watts, of Timmins, was somewhat of a disappointment. These boxers kept away from each other too much from the crowd's standpoint. Watts apparently was not able to hit Williams to any material extent, and Williams did not make much impression on Watts. Watts, of course, was handicapped by an injured hand, and eventually had to quit in the fourth round on this account, the decision going to Williams.

**Porcupine Agricultural Fair  
at Golden City Sept. 10-11**

Big Prize List in All Usual Fair Sections. Big Poultry Section. Team Drawing Contest. Sports and Races. Special Classes for Boy Scouts and Girl Guides. Many Donations and Special Prizes.

The prize lists are out for the annual Porcupine Agricultural Fair to be held at Golden City (Porcupine) on Tuesday and Wednesday, Sept. 10th and 11th. The Porcupine Fair for some years past has been a noteworthy feature of the season, showing the possibilities of this country for agriculture and allied lines. As usual special attention is given in the prize list to poultry and pet stock, there being full classes in these lines, as well as in dairy products, garden vegetables, flowers, plants, domestic arts, etc. There is also a good prize list for horses, cattle, sheep, hogs, fruits, field grain, field roots, miscellaneous art, fancy work, children's classes, etc. There are special departments for Boy Scouts and Girl Guides.

One of the special features will be the team drawing contest. This contest is divided into two classes—for teams under 3000 lbs., and teams 3000 lbs. or over. First prize for teams of 3000 lbs. or over is \$50.00, and for those under 3000 lbs. it is \$40.00. The second prize in each case is \$25.00. Drawing contest must be drawn on the fair grounds and on the pole. Certificates of weight must accompany each entry. Buggy whip only allowed. In past years this competition has roused the keenest interest, and this year it is likely that the contest will be even more interesting than usual.

The baby show, to be held in the station waiting room, is also a special feature of the fair that always rouses much interest. The baby show is for children 15 months and younger.

There is a good list of prizes and events in the line of races and sports. In addition there are special Boy Scout features including water boiling contest, friction fire demonstration and knotting contest.

The exhibits of leaves, barks, woods, wild flowers, weeds and photographs,

by the Boy Scouts may be expected to be specially interesting. There will also be a number of collections of Scout and Indian signs, useful articles made by Scouts, model bridge or derrick, display of Scoutcraft, etc. Among the items in the Girl Guide classes are completely dressed dolls, needlework, cakes, exhibits of Guidecraft, knitting, etc.

A whole page in the prize list is devoted to listing donations and special prizes.

An entry form, perforated to tear out easily, is included in the prize list book for the convenience of those wishing to enter any of the classes.
