LIBERALS OF DISTRICT MET AT PORQUIS JUNCTION

Federal Member Given Great Reception. Many from Timmins Present at Gathering Last Week.

There was a gathering of the Liberals of the district at Porquis Junction on Wednesday of last week with a number present from Timmins and other parts of the Porcupine camp, as well as other sections of the district. There was great interest in the gathering, so The Advance herewith gives the following extended report of the event as given by The Cochrane Northland Post.

"Between sixty and seventy stalwarts of the Liberal party, delegates from all parts of the riding, met at Porquis Junction on Wednesday afternoon to attend an Executive meeting of the North Temiskaming Liberal Organization called for the purpose of hearing the report of our federal member, Mr. Joseph Bradette, of his stewardship since his election and talk over things generally.

"If there ever could have been any doubt as to the high regard and esteem in which Mr. Bradette is held by his constituents throughout the riding, it must have surely been dispelled by the unanimous and enthusiastic acclaim with which Mr. Bradette and his address was received. All subsequent speakers in the most eulogistic terms referred to the earnest endeavours in the interest of the whole constituency which marked Mr. Bradette's parliamentary career and has made him an outstanding figure not only in his own riding but among his colleagues in the House of Commons. This feeling of appreciation of his good work during his tenure of office culminated in a resolution moved by Mr. Harry Fine, of Ansonville, seconded by Mr. Belanger, of Kapuskasing and unanimously carried that this meeting of the Executive recommend unanimously to the next convention the candidature of Mr. Bradette and further recommend that he be elected candidate by acclamation.

"While the meeting was primarily called for the federal organization, the fact that the federal riding of North Temiskaming comprises the two provincial ridings of North and South Cochrane coupled with the fact that a provincial election in undoubtedly in the offing, naturally brought provincial interests much to the fore, especially with the view expressed by Mr. Bradette that a federal election would possibly not take place until 1931. Since therefore, federal matters did not appear pressing and calling for any change in the organization, a great deal of time was devoted to provincial matters. Naturally, there being two provincial ridings represented, no steps for definite organization could be taken but the presidents of both ridings, Mr. Dan Johnston, of Matheson, who had with him on the platform, J. Bradette, M.P., T. McDonald, President of South Cochrane Riding, Geo. A. Smith, President of North Cochrane Riding and acting Secretary of the federal organization and Dr. McInnis, of Timmins.

"The President after expressing his gratification at the good attendance briefly outlining the object of the meeting, called upon Mr. Bradette, who in a forty minute address gave an outline of his activities and showed his unflinching loyalty to the party. He repeated the salient features of his address in French.

"Mr. Bradette referred to the close contact in which he had always kept with all parts of his large riding, having travelled over the entire section twice, and how he had kept informed about the requirements of each part. He had not always been able to get immediate results in all matters which he followed up but among the principal achievements he referred to the votes put through for a Post Office building in Timmins, the Indian Wing of the Hospital in Cochrane, the Experimental Farm at Kapuskasing, improvement in the train service between Cochrane and Hearst and various other matters.

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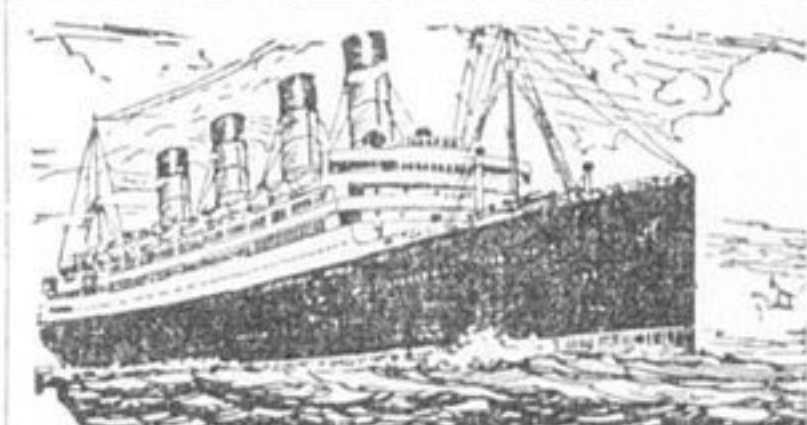
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that this was in reality a matter for the different provinces and when a definite route had been decided, support from the federal Government would be forthcoming, but the federal Government could not do anything until the different provinces had decided on such a definite route to connect the different existing links.

"Mr. Bradette warmly affirmed his loyalty to his leader, Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King and the members of the Cabinet and in warm terms of praise and admiration outlined the characteristics and the particular abilities of each, which in itself was listened to with the greatest interest by all present.

"After Mr. Bradette's address the President called upon various presidents of local liberal associations and leaders of the party in turn; Mr. Rowlandson of Porquis Junction, Mr. Montford of Iroquois Falls, Dr. McInnis of Timmins, Mr. McDonald of Matheson, Mr. Belanger of Kapuskasing, Mr. Dean Kester of Timmins, A. T. H. Taylor of Timmins, Mr. Labrosse of Kapuskasing and Mr. Harry Fine of Ansonville, brought out each, some salient features helpful to the interest of the organization in general but most of them also brought up provincial matters and the need to organize for the coming provincial elections as the Liberal party has never organized before here.

"How much provincial matters dominated the meeting after the address of Mr. Bradette had been presented was shown by the President calling upon Dr. Foster of Kapuskasing to speak on provincial matters. Dr. Foster is being groomed for the candidature in the next provincial elections and he outlined the platform on which he proposes to run. Particular stress was laid by him on the pulpwood situation with reference to settlers' wood and to the township roads. He exhorted the liberals of the two ridings to get together and organize immediately and very thoroughly trench themselves and be ready to offer some really constructive programme.

"The meeting closed at around 5 o'clock with the singing of the National Anthem."

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
