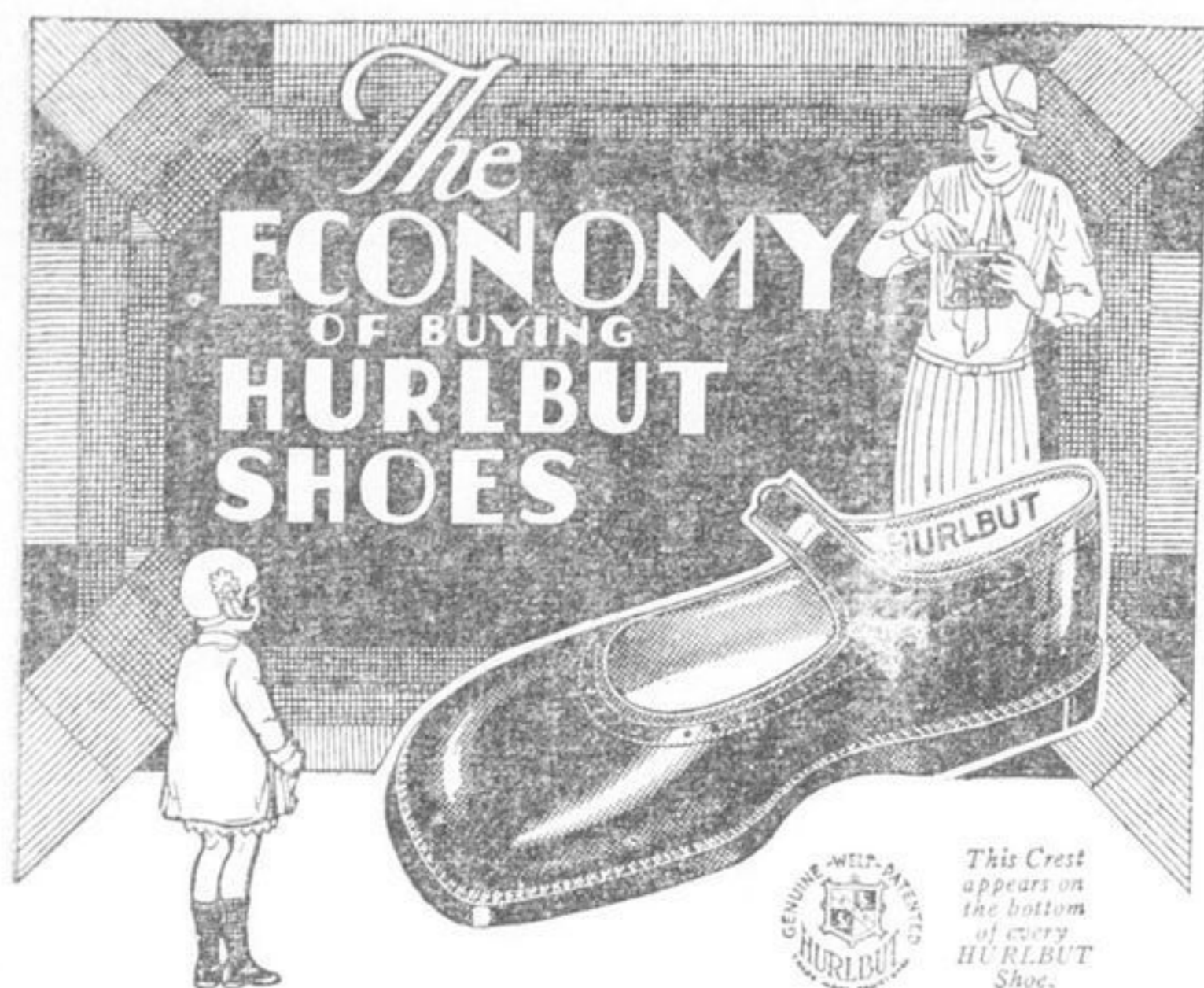

# Ten Years Ago

in Timmins

From data in the Porcupine Advance Files.

As noted in this column last week the Advance was not issued this week ten years ago, the number being missed to allow holidays for the staff, following the practice in common usage then by local weekly newspapers. However, any issue of The Advance ten years ago allows for about twice as much material as given in these weekly reviews of ten years ago in Timmins, so the article appears this week as usual, covering news and views of ten years ago.

This week ten years ago The Advance and other friends in town received letters from J. D. MacLean, who was in Toronto undergoing special medical treatment for injuries. In this connection The Advance said: "Letters received in town from J. D. MacLean, town foreman, who is at the Toronto General hospital undergoing treatment for his injured back, suggest that at the present time he is suffering from a form of paralysis in the hips and legs, but it is expected that this will pass away as the treatment for the injured spine progresses. "Jack" at any rate writes cheery and optimistic letters, though he expects to be under treatment for some time to come. At present he is encased in a plaster form and expects to be kept in this unnatural stiff and formal shape for a couple of weeks, after which he will go to his home at New Liskeard for a rest and to aid in his complete recovery. If hearty good wishes will help in his recovering his former health and strength, there will be so many from his friends in Timmins that this prince of good fellows will soon be well and around again in his usual cheerful and genial way."

Eight Russians, Austrians, Roumanians, Jugo-Slavians, and what have you, were before Justice of the Peace H. E. Montgomery on Sept. 1st, 1919, charged with gambling on the Lord's Day. Each of the eight men had to pay a fine of five dollars and costs. The fines were the result of a raid made by Chief Wilson and Constables Dan McInnis and P. Collins on a house about which there had been a number of complaints. When the police forced their way in they found only six men at the table. Chief Wilson had a hunch that at least one man had managed to hide, but there seemed no other place to hide except, perhaps, under the bed in the room. The chief waited until the narves and particulars of the six foreigners in sight had been taken, and then he called out in a loud, bold voice:—"And now you'd better come out from under the bed, till we get you to complete the crowd." The answer to this was that two men, both great big hulking fellows, crawled out very humbly from beneath the bed, much covered with fuzz and confusion.

Visitors to town, especially those coming in by rail, these days seldom fail to enthuse over the park on Spruce street, alongside the T. & N. O. railway depot. But it was not always thus. For years the railway approach to the town was anything but a bower of beauty. It was instead a sort of sandy waste, and thus to first impressions re-

ceived of the town by strangers hardly did credit to the town. Ten years and more ago many individuals in town backed up The Advance in suggestions that the T. & N. O. do something to make the station grounds more presentable. What The Advance suggested was a spot similar to the grounds around the Englehart station. At that time Englehart had about the finest station grounds on the T. & N. O. Something of the propaganda carried on in the matter ten years ago may be gathered from the following paragraph in The Advance ten years ago: "Mayor McInnis and others have been continually after the T. & N. O. recently in efforts to secure better appearing surroundings for the handsome railway depot at Timmins. There is no question about the good appearance of the T. & N. O. station building, and it is only proper that the grounds around should be in keeping. The efforts to improve the appearance of the station grounds have at last borne some fruit, the preliminary steps having been taken last week (week of Aug. 29th) in the preparation of a plot for a special lawn and garden at the station. The land at the side of the station building has been all levelled off and a goodly-sized portion of it neatly fenced and otherwise prepared for the installing of a lawn and garden plot."

In this column last week reference was made to the items in The Advance ten years ago in regard to the accident and injuries to Mr. John Kilgore, plasterer. The following further paragraph may be added herewith:—"Mr. John Kilgore is able to be out and around again after being laid up for a couple of weeks with injuries sustained when his horse ran away, smashing the buggy, etc. Mr. Kilgore had some ribs broken in the accident, and was also injured internally. He is now, however, well on the way to complete recovery again."

It is always interesting to note the advertisers in past issues of any local newspaper. On several occasions in this column of news and views of ten years ago in Timmins the different advertisers in certain issues have been specially listed. Ten years ago the biggest advertiser was the Marshall-Ecclestone Hardware, this firm running a full-page advertisement each and every week. It was a bright, newsy page and was widely read, the firm at that time building up a notable business and reputation in the district. The George Taylor Hardware carried a half-page advertisement of interesting and valuable news of bargains and service. The Curtis Drug Co.'s quarter page advertisement each week was also a feature of the paper, while the New Empire theatre was a good advertiser, using generous space each week and reaping the benefit therefrom. Still another advertiser believing in regular advertising and lots of it was the Northern Canada Supply Co. None of these firms knew anything about hard times or poor business, though in other parts of the province, and even among some here there were complaints along this line. Ten years ago advertising paid; it still pays, only more so, because people are becoming more and more educated to its value. Indeed, to-day, advertising is one of the indispensables. Halperin, jeweler and optician; S. Bucovetsky, men's wear, 44 Third Avenue, Timmins; Imperial Bank of Canada; Citizens' Liberty League of Ontario, campaigning against the Ontario Temperance Act; H. Horwitz, jeweler; Leo Mascioli, contractor; John W. Fogg, lumber coal, supplies, etc.; Hamilton B. Wills, stockbroker; T. E. Strain, mason work. South Porcupine; A. J. Shephard, plastering contractor; I.O.O.F.; L.O.L.; Timmins Lunch Car, Jos. Brisson; Dr. L. Gagnon, V.S., Halleybury; J. A. Howse, wholesale tobaccos and confectionery; Cleveland and Buffalo Line, steamship service; L. LaSalle, second-hand store; W. H. Wilson, J.P., hunters' licenses, typewriting, marriage license, etc.; Cottage hospital, Timmins; Cook and Mitchell, barristers and solicitors; Sutcliffe and Neelandt, civil engineers and land surveyors; Great War Veterans' Association, Timmins; W. N. and P. H. Stock, jewelers and opticians. In each case the advertiser was located in Timmins or had a branch office here, except in the cases where specially noted. In addition to the display advertising listed, there were many classified advertisements and legal notices. There were over three columns taken up with the legal notices of sitting of the appeal boards in connection with the registration for the provincial elections. In addition other legal notices were in connection with the estates of persons who had died.

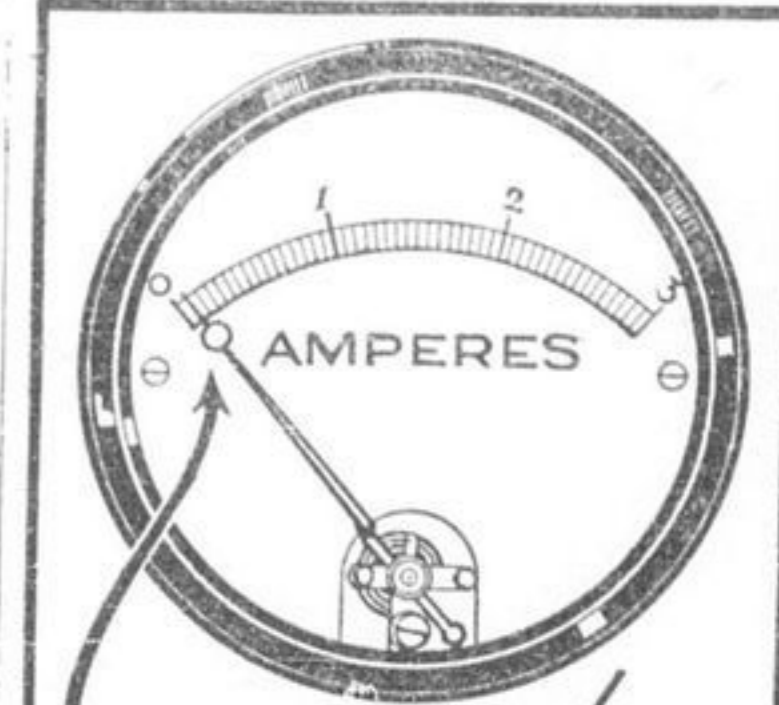
