GRAVEL AND SAND—AND PLACER

A little girl one day took home a copy of the War Cry that someone had given her. "What have you there?" the mother asked her little six-year-old daughter. "Oh, just another of those advertisements about Heaven!" the youngster replied. Probably the best "advertisement about Heaven" that this town has ever known is the residence here for over ten years of Rev. J. D. Parks. It is an advertisement beautifully illustrated with kindly deeds and earnest service to mankind. In his life here Rev. Mr. Parks has shown how the biblical injunctions can be carried out literally, in spirit and in truth. He has visited those in prison, comforted the widow and the fatherless in their affliction, cared for the sick, and been a true friend to everyone, hating none and helping all. He has been loyal to his fellow man. An able and talented preacher, his life has been his best sermon. Few, perhaps, fully realize the value his residence here has been to the community. His active assistance in all good causes is known, and the steady round of help to those in trouble and distress may be appreciated. But the influence of his cheerfulness, his helpful life and his fine personality are not so easily estimated. The value of the time and effort he gave to the young people will be apparent in growing force in later years. In his farewell address to the Kiwanis Rev. Mr. Parks spoke of the wealth he carried with him in leaving Timmins. It is a wealth that any man might covet—the wealth won by service to others and thought for others. Faithful to his church work, active in Kiwanis Club efforts, in the Children's Aid Society cause, and in every other line of endeavour for community benefit, Rev. Mr. Parks has always emphasized the importance of the truly better things of life. Eleven years is a long time in a young country like this, and service over such a period deserves its reward. In leaving here, Rev. Mr. Parks is tendered part payment on account of services rendered—the gratitude of those he has helped, the affection of those to whom he has ministered in their affliction and the admiration and good wishes of all.

In an editorial note last week The Pembroke Standard-Observer said: "At 69 years of age, Mr. J. E. Pedlow, Rensselaer, who has just retired from business talks about going to a university, and taking some course, possibly law. Apparently, he has never read that a famous doctor was of opinion that men before they had reached his age should be chloroformed." In reply to this note it is safe to say that all who have had the pleasure of knowing J. E. Pedlow will be certain that he has read all about the famous doctor's foolish humorism about chloroforming men at 40 years of age. Mr. Pedlow has always kept himself closely informed on the news from day to day, being not only a believer in the use of newspapers for advertising but also a keen reader of the columns of the press for the news and views of the day. Mr. Pedlow is a living proof of the folly of so-called age limits. At 69 years of age he is more active in mind and body than the average man of half his age. To suggest the chloroforming of men of any age who possess the energy, the spirit and the talent evidenced in men like J. E. Pedlow is a criminal form of foolishness. To carry the joke along, however, it would be interesting to consider the operation necessary to chloroform a man of the Pedlow type. It would take at least seven medical men for the task, two for the actual work and the other five to hold the patient. Being Irish, Mr. Pedlow himself might say that the doctors would have to put him under an anaesthetic before they could chloroform him. Active and able and full of energy and mental power, with a healthy physique to back it all, and starting at 69 years of age to take up a new profession. Mr. Pedlow is a living proof of the falsity of the idea that a man's years have anything to do with his age.

Provincial Police Take in \$600.00 in Fines Here

At police court here this week the Provincial officers took in \$600.00 in fines in liquor cases. A charge of being in illegal possession of liquor cost Ben Jacobs \$200.00, while a similar charge against Michael Mazzuca resulted in a similar fine of \$200.00 and costs. WELL-KNOWN INDIAN GUIDE OF TEMAGAMI FAME, IS DEAD

Many from this part of the North and from other more distant points will learn with sincere regret of the death of a North Bay Indian on Sunday of Frank White Bear, generally known as Chief White Bear, one of the well-

known guides in the Temagami area. For a great many years previous to 1924, Chief White Bear guided hunters and fishermen to the best hunting and fishing spots in the wonderful Temagami area. He knew the Temagami district very thoroughly and his ability as a guide was beyond question. Among the many for whom he acted as guide there were few indeed who do not carry kindly thoughts of this able and picturesque Indian. Tuesday afternoon of this week Chief White Bear was carried by an imposing band of Ojibway Indians, the solemn procession taking the plain wooden casket to its last resting place on Bear Island, Lake Temagami. A widow survives. Chief White Bear had only been ill for about three weeks. He was operated upon some days ago in the hopes of saving his life but all efforts to preserve his life was unavailing and he passed away on Sunday.

New Half-Year Record in Canada's Mining Work

New gains in nickel and copper and further advances in the production of many other metals and non-metals are noted in a special half-yearly report on Canada's mineral production compiled in the mining, metallurgical and chemical branch and published by the Dominion bureau of statistics. Following the attainment of a new output record in 1928 valued at \$274,989,487, or 11.2 per cent. over the 1927 total, the rise in the output of metals and non-metals in the half-year ending June, 1929, to a value of 172 per cent. above the total for the first half of 1928, once again pointed to a continuance of prosperity in Canada's mining industry that forecasts the possibility of further new records being established when the totals for the present calendar year are compiled. Metals and non-metals from Canadian ores reached a value of \$123,702,334 in the half-year ending June, 1929, as compared with \$105,632,571 for the six months ending June, 1928. Copper, gold and nickel were the lead-

ing products in point of value. Copper showed the most outstanding gain in the mineral production for the first half of this year, rising 23.9 per cent. over the quantity produced in the first half of 1928. Higher prices during the first half of 1929 raised the total valuation of copper output for the period to 68.1 per cent. above the figures for the first half of the preceding year. Gold production reached a total of 940,000 fine ounces valued at \$19,431,626, or 3.7 per cent. above the figures for the first half of 1928. Nearly 55 million pounds of nickel were produced in the half-year ending June, 1929, showing a rise of 18.3 per cent. in quantity and 21.1 per cent. in value over the corresponding totals for the first half of 1928. Refined and electrolytic nickel produced in Canada in the first half of 1929 reached a total of 34,891,047 pounds, as compared with 21,955,829 pounds in the first half of the preceding year. While lead production was very slightly less than during the first half of 1928, better prices prevailing during the period raised the total output value to \$8,116,385, or more than the total for the first half of 1928. Silver production showed a gain of more than half a million ounces, or 4.7 per cent., to a total of 11,307,341 fine ounces. Zinc production figures were up 179 million pounds to a total of 103,330,350 pounds valued at \$5,955,962, or 11 per cent. higher in quantity and 14.8 per cent. greater in value than during the first half of 1928. Coal, gas and oil all reached higher levels.

Pavement at Kirkland to be Ready Before Snow

Kirkland Lake, Sept. 4th—Special to The Advance.—As was promised by the Teek Township Council last month, actual work on the pavement plan for Government road, Kirkland Lake, was started Sept. 2nd. The weather permitting, McNamara Construction Co. expect to have the contract finished and a paved street between Kirkland Lake Gold Mining Co. and the Station road before the snow falls.

Winners of the Wrigley Marathon Swim Friday

Edward F. Keating, of New York, won the Wrigley marathon swim at Toronto on Friday last. The course was 15 miles. There were 238 entries including some of the world's best swimmers. George Young was early taken out of the water. "I guess I must be yellow," Young is quoted as saying.

Keating won \$25,000 by his victory, while there are also good cash prizes for the other leaders in the swim.

Keating's powerful stroke, a relentless doggedness and a precision carried him to a 500-yard victory over Ernst Vierkotter, giant German swimmer, now a resident of Toronto. From 11th place at the end of the first of eight and a half laps, Keating went steadily onward. Cold water claimed a setback for some in front of him, others slipped back becoming exhausted, but Keating never faltered, his white arms coated with grease moved with a rhythm and power that carried him into the lead in the seventh lap ahead of Norman Ross, of Chicago. From then on Keating was not in serious trouble but the mighty challenger, Vierkotter, in the last lap in vain attempted to overtake the flashing New Yorker.

Norman Ross finished third after weakening in the last few laps.

A rank outsider, Isadore Sponder, of Port Colborne, "just another name on the programme," before the race, startled the swimming world by crowding his way into fourth place.
