NUMBER OF CASES AT THIS WEEK'S POLICE COURT HERE

There were more than the usual number of cases at police court this week. Liquor cases predominated, but there were other cases also before the court. One drunk paid the usual \$10.00 and costs, while another was allowed a week's remand. Three drunks who had apparently been hitting up canned heat, using the athletic ground as their alcohol parlour, were each fined \$25.00 and costs. One of these paid yesterday, but the other two were seeking to raise the required amount to-day so as to avoid a thirty-day visit to Haileybury.

On a charge of having liquor not obtained on her permit Mrs. Gordyko paid \$100.00 and costs to the town. Provincial Officer Hartlieb charged Yalmer Koski, who keeps a poolroom on Fourth avenue, with having liquor in a public place, and as a result Koski was required to pay a fine of \$200.00 and costs.

For leaving the scene of an accident one motorist was assessed \$25.00 and costs. A charge of reckless driving resulted in a fine of \$10.00 and costs. The use of wrong markers in another case caused the imposition of a fine of \$10.00 and costs. A lady from Cochrane who was driving a car here without the necessary license was fined \$5.00 and costs. One reckless driving charge was dismissed. A charge of disorderly conduct was given a remand for a week. A man who failed to pay a taxi driver after driving round in the car was assessed a total of \$22.50, on a charge of obtaining credit under false pretences, the amount including a fine, the taxi driver's bill and the costs of the court. A claim for wages was suggested as more suitable for Division Court as the man charged had not hired the plaintiff, the later apparently being placed at work by a subordinate. A couple of other cases, including charges of breach of the game laws, an assault case and other charges are mentioned elsewhere in this issue.
