## Ten Years Ago in Timmins

From data in the Porcupine Advance Files.

An extended report was given in The Advance ten years ago of the teachers' convention for this inspectorate for the year 1919. The report was written for The Advance by Miss K. McDonald, then at South Porcupine school. The convention was the second annual meeting of the North Temiskaming Teachers' Institute and was held at the Monteith Demonstration Farm. The beautiful agricultural buildings were thrown open to the teachers, and we made ourselves very much at home," said the report, which added complimentary comment in regard to the meals served. The programme for the two days included various very interesting items, among those taking part being—Rev. Fr. Theriault, Timmins; J. R. Pickering, Iroquois Falls; Miss Monteith, Iroquois Falls; Mr. Brown,

of Porcupine; Miss McDonald, South Porcupine; Miss Elder, Smooth Rock Falls; Mr. Wildgust, of the North Bay Normal School; Miss Jean Inglis, of Timmins; Archdeacon Woodall, of Porcupine Junction; Mr. Hanlon, of the Demonstration Farm; Mr. Nixon, of New Liskeard; Rev. J. A. Donnell, of Halleybury; Rev. Mr. Summerbee, of Connaught; Inspector Wilson, Halleybury; Captain C. S. Carter, Timmins, was elected president of the institute for the ensuing year; Miss Houghton, Porcupine Junction, vice-president; Mr. McLeod, Swastika, secretary; Miss Hoste Elder, Smooth Rock Falls, treasurer; Miss G. Corman, Timmins librarian; delegate to the O.E.A., Miss Scott, of Schumacher.

The murder charge against the young woman arrested here by Officer R. Allen in connection with the finding of the dead body of an infant in a shack in Moneta was withdrawn. The young lady had pleaded guilty to the charge of not giving proper attention and care to a child in her charge and on this charge was allowed to go on suspended sentence. Starting with no clues and with the whole matter of the finding of the dead child a mystery that did not appear possible to solve, R. Allen by patient and careful work built up a very strong case, proving the identity of the child and securing other evidence that left little doubt as to the facts of the case. The young woman believed to be the mother of the dead baby was eventually arrested and charged with murder. She was committed for trial by the magistrate, but when the case came before the Supreme Court at Halleybury in October, 1919, Crown Attorney Simley withdrew the charge. It was understood at the time that the withdrawal was due to the fact that there was no direct evidence obtainable to connect the young woman with the actual death of the child. However, there was much commendation at the time for the clever work done by R. Allen in securing evidence and building a case that seemed to solve the mystery of the dead child's identity.

Ten years ago there was an election contested in progress, the candidates for this riding being Mac Lang, Liberal, R. S. Potter, Conservative, and John Vanier, Labour. There was much interest evidenced, as may be noted from the issues of The Advance. The contest was a clean and lively one, and each of the candidates put up a noteworthy battle. Each of the three candidates had a quarter page advertisement in The Advance, setting forth their platforms, and those of their parties. It is worth noting now that both Mr. Potter and Mr. Vanier made special reference to the desirability of building the T. & N. O. extension to James Bay.

At the high court at Halleybury ten years ago a South Porcupine Serbian told a peculiar story to explain his side of the case in the matter of the charge against him of securing \$600.00 from the bank account of an Austrian who could not read or write. The police evidence told of the Austrian's bank account being withdrawn by a man claiming to be the Austrian himself and presenting the latter's bank book, passports and other documents. The bank officials identified the Serbian as the man who did this. The Serbian's own story was an odd one. He said that he came to Timmins with about \$900.00 in cash of his own. Here he

fell in with two chums whom he could identify only as "Matt" and "Mike." He said they got him drunk and next day told him he had lost all his money in a poker game. Then he went to South Porcupine where he met "Jake" who gave him "some awful strong liquor." He had about fifteen drinks, he said, and then he lost count. Next day he woke up in Montreal where he found "Matt" and "Mike." They told him what he had done and advised him to skip to the United States. The Serbian said that his conscience would not allow him to do anything like this and so, instead, he started back to return any money he had left. He was arrested at North Bay. When questioned as to a visit he paid to Sudbury, he said that he had only gone there to see if he could borrow \$100.00 from a friend there, so as to have the full amount. Neither judge nor jury appeared to believe this story, though they were certainly interested. The Serbian was given a term of two years and four months.

At the town council meeting ten years ago Councillor L. S. Newton asked that the taxes of all returned soldiers paid during the year be returned to them as some small evidence of the appreciation felt for their services. The town council generally favoured some procedure along this line but referred the question to the town solicitor to see what could be done legally in the matter. At the same meeting of the council a by-law was passed to provide for the taking of a census in town. The census was to be made by the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines, Ltd., without any expense to the town, to learn the population, housing accommodation, etc., with a view to having ample housing here for all. The council also gave authority for the calling for tenders for the clearing and stumping of the new cemetery. The purchase of a new snow plough was also authorized by the council.

There was a very successful meeting in Timmins in the interests of Mac Lang ten years ago in the provincial election. Dr. McInnis occupied the chair and made a hit with his opinion on the temperance question. "I believe in temperance," he said, "but not in prohibition that can not be carried out." The speakers included Major Mac Lang, Milton Carr, A. G. Slaght and others. The humorous and pointed address by Milton Carr was the hit of the evening.

There should be much of interest and much food for thought in the following paragraph from The Advance ten years ago:—"Those who were in Timmins when Consvoitch, the Russian orator, performed here will regret that it was not Mr. Justice Kelly, instead of Judge Rose, who presided at the trial of the said Consvoitch at Halleybury before the high court. Last week at the high court at Halleybury Mr. Justice Kelly had half a dozen applications before him from foreigners desiring naturalization, and he showed clearly that he wants none but reasonable and loyal men among the citizens of Canada. He questioned the men applying for naturalization very closely as to their views, but all frankly denied all leanings toward Bolshevism or other form of disloyalty. At another time during the sittings of the high court, Mr. Justice Kelly took occasion to explain that Canada must show much more care and attention in regard to those who are admitted to citizenship. Mr. Justice Kelly said he thought it the duty of every citizen of this country to take an interest in the applications for naturalization, and if any person thought he knew of any good reason for objecting to such being granted he should bring it to the attention of the court, where it would receive careful attention. The applications made last week for naturalization were from the following Timmins men who gave their occupants as that of miners, and said they were married:—Victor Hultman and Albert Andersen, formerly of Sweden; Demetro Metrochuk, formerly of Austria. Other applications included:—Abraham Assad, formerly of Syria, merchant, now of Schumacher; Martin Andrechuk, formerly of Poland, now of Brethour township; Arthur Conklin, formerly of the United States, prospector, now of Gillies Depot. Their applications were all taken up for consideration."

According to an item published in The Advance of Oct. 15th, 1919, the Associated Goldfields at Larder Lake had up to that time expended close to a million dollars all told in the development of the properties in which they were interested. At that time the company reported having \$600,000.00 in cash and Victory bonds for further work, it being intended then to pro-

ceed with the installation of a mill to handle the large low-grade ore body blocked out.

Ten years ago a brisk campaign was in progress throughout the Dominion to raise half a million dollars for the work of the Navy League of Canada. The objective aimed at for the Porcupine district was \$3,000.00, and the local Navy League was organizing to raise this amount.

Allan Ouderkirik mysteriously disappeared from Mindoka in the spring of 1918. No trace was found of the missing man until ten years ago when a body was found in the bush near Rosegrove, Englehart district. John Thornton, of Mindoka, identified the body as that of Ouderkirik. The latter had lived with Thornton, who was certain of the identification on account of the size of the dead man, as well as the clothing worn, the watch, ring, etc. Death appeared to be due to natural causes and the coroner decided an inquest not necessary. Apparently, Ouderkirik had been taken ill while going through the bush, probably fainting, or being attacked by heart trouble, according to the circumstances and conditions so far as they could be estimated. At any rate there were no indications of any sort of foul play.

The final meeting of the Timmins Football Club for the 1919 season was held in the council chambers on Oct. 21st, 1919, with President J. K. Moore in the chair. The reports showed the club in excellent shape in every way. After paying all expenses, as well as indebtedness incurred by another football club years before, the 1919 season was closed with a good balance in the treasury. The meeting gave special praise and thanks to secretary W. A. Field and E. H. Bridger for the fine season, while other members of the executive also came in for bouquets. It was suggested that the club keep together for the winter, so as to be ready to secure any likely talent for next season and to continue the organization at its 1919 efficiency and strength. This idea was heartily approved and the president asked to keep it in mind and call meetings as frequently as desirable. A grant of \$10 was passed to the N.O.F.A. to help that body close the season without indebtedness. An honorarium of \$50.00 was authorized for a player who had been injured in one of the games. The motion passed at a previous meeting to pay for all boots returned by the players at the end of the season was also endorsed. In this connection the secretary reported the number of sweaters, pants, boots, etc., on hand, and authority was given to have all the boots cleaned and oiled so as to be in good shape for next season.

Among the local and personal items in The Advance ten years ago were the following:—"The Lake Shore and Teck-Hughes mines at Kirkland Lake are back at work again this week, getting the mines and plants in readiness to resume operations. The strike at Kirkland Lake is not yet declared off, the Union, indeed, recently voting to continue the contest. But the two mines referred to believe that the matter will be adjusted or that they will be able to get working staffs apart from the Union men formerly employed." "Mrs. J. Gauthier, of Verner, is visiting her son, Mr. F. J. Edwards." "At the official nominations held at Timmins on Monday, Oct. 13th, the following were the candidates nominated for this riding in the provincial elections: R. S. Potter, of Matheson, as the Conservative candidate; Mac Lang, of South Porcupine, as the Liberal candidate; and John Vanier, of Iroquois Falls, as the Independent Labour Party candidate." "Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Sullivan returned last week from their wedding tour in the east, and have taken up residence in town. Their many friends here will extend sincere good wishes." "All her many friends will regret to know of the illness of Mrs. J. K. Moore, who has been under medical care for the past week or two. All will wish Mrs. Moore a speedy and complete return to health." "In honour of the visit to Timmins of His Highness the Prince of Wales, and to allow all an opportunity of seeing and greeting him, Thursday, Oct. 16th, has been declared a civic holiday by proclamation of the mayor, Dr. J. A. McInnis." "Mr. Fred Thompson, returning officer for the riding of Cochrane, was taken ill at Timmins on Monday evening, but is now making satisfactory progress to recovery." "A jury in the high court at Halleybury last week awarded John W. Snider, a Casey township farmer, \$1,000.00 for damages done to his land through the overflowing of slimes from the Casey-Cobalt Mining Co.'s mill. Snider asked for \$2,500.00 damages; some of the settlers gave evidence to the effect that \$2,000.00 was a fair

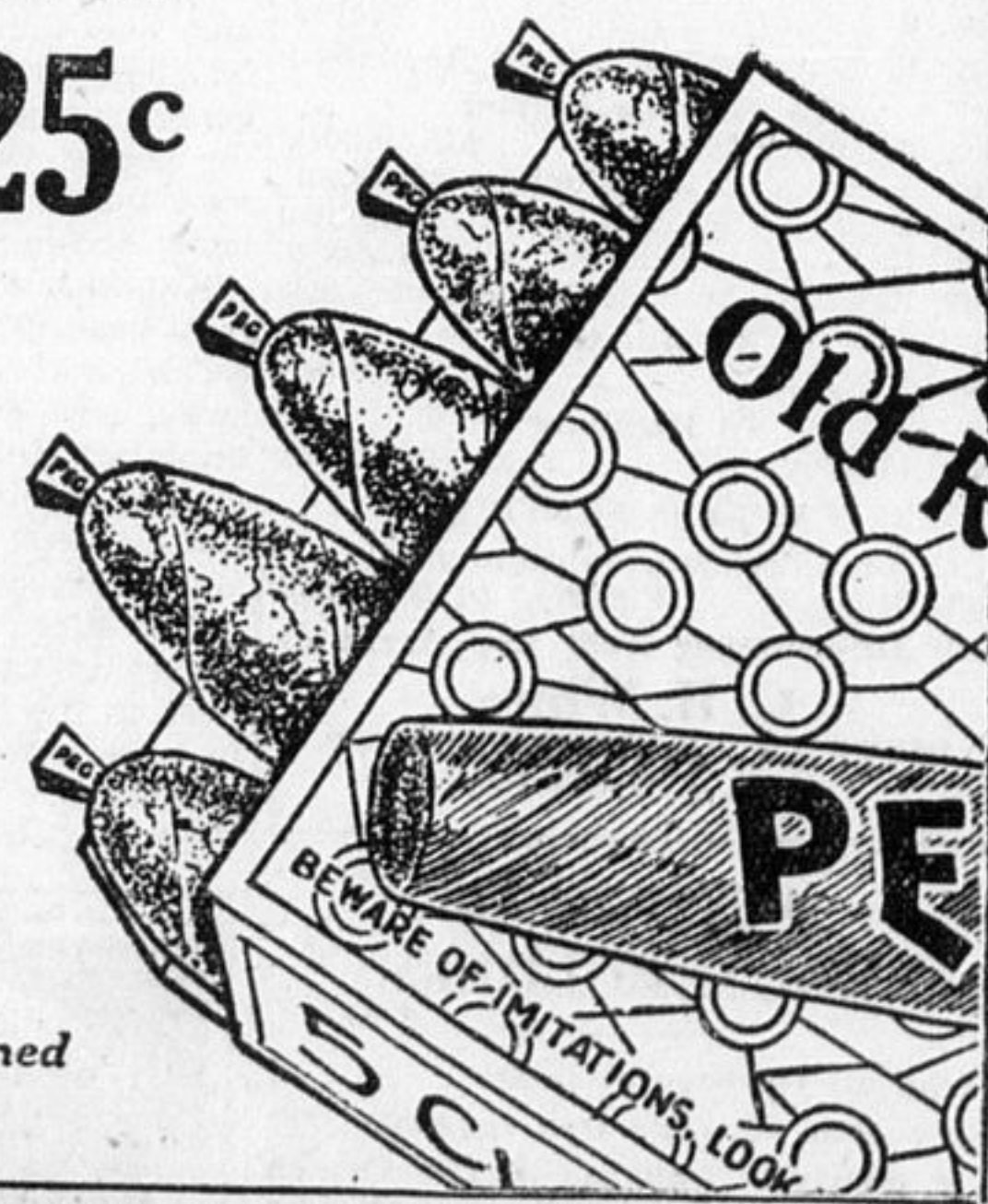

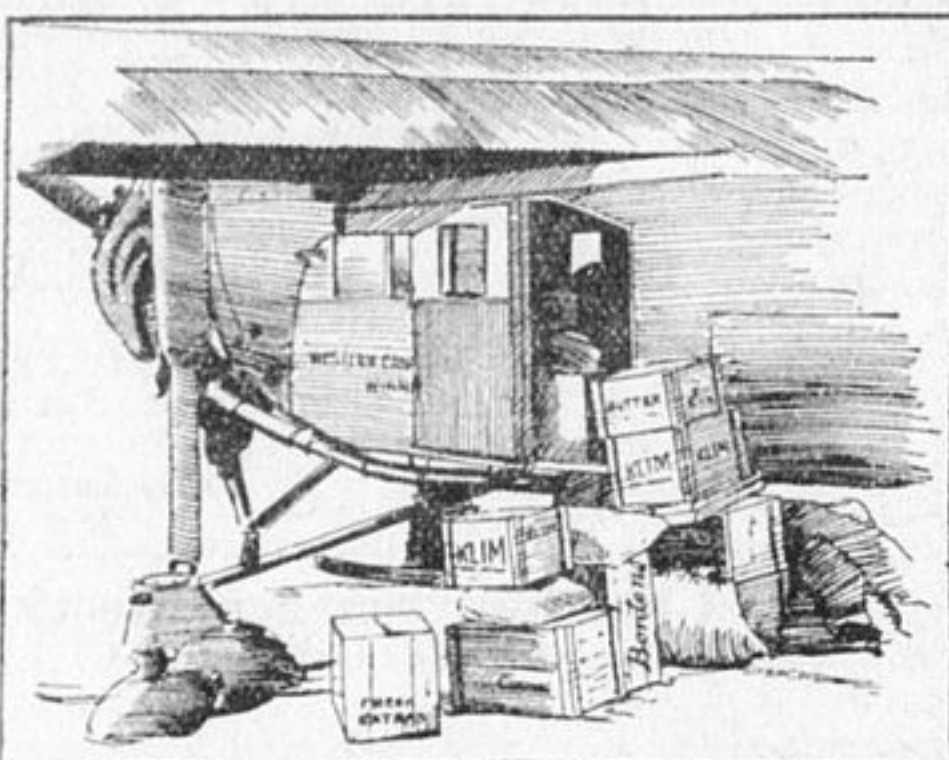

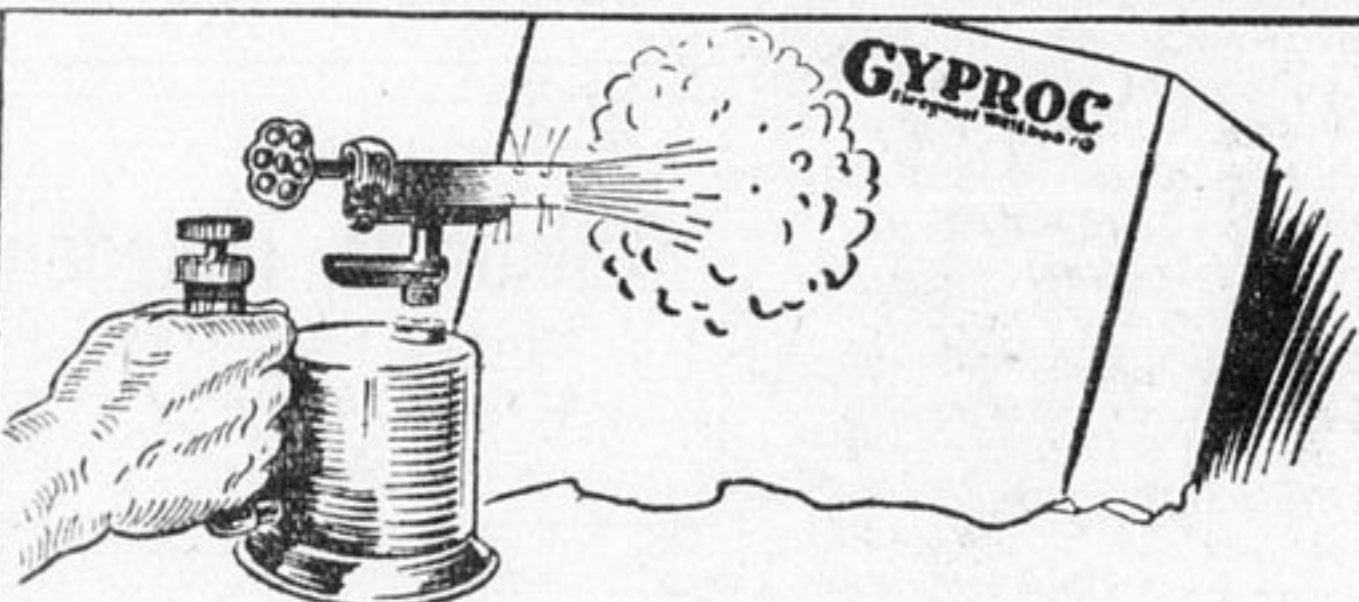
