HUNDREDS WILL BE HELPED BY CHARITY TURKEY STAG

Estimated That Eight Hundred Children and Three Hundred Adults Will Have Christmas Joys Through Bounty of the Turkey Stag

Each year the entertainment features of the Timmins Charity Turkey Stag are emphasized and this is quite proper. At the same time, as the manager "Lap" LaPrairie points out, the purpose and result of the event should not be overlooked. "It is a privilege to help the needy" is the motto that "Lap" has taken, and this, the seventh annual Turkey Stag, according to the estimates made, will provide eight hundred children and three hundred adults with the wonderful hampers sent to needy families by the Turkey Stag each year. These hampers are packed under personal supervision and the contents of each is adjusted to suit the special needs of each particular case. From actual enquiry last year The Advance knows that the hampers contain enough foodstuffs to carry the family receiving it for a couple of weeks. In addition there are gifts for the youngsters. These hampers mean a real Christmas to the needy people receiving them. It is certainly true that the Charity Turkey Stag is fully justified and worth far more than it costs for the results obtained and the great good done, to say nothing of the Christmas joy brought to literally hundreds through the distribution of the hampers.

While the value of the Turkey Stag may well be emphasized for "sweet charity's sake," it is still well to keep in mind its remarkable value and interest as an entertainment. Unless the public wholeheartedly support the event as they have done in the past its usefulness is handicapped. And as an entertainment the Turkey Stag is without an equal. This year's Turkey Stag, which will be held in the St. Anthony's parish hall on Friday evening, Dec. 20th, features many attractive novelties, as well as the old favourites, bridge, 500, euchre and cribbage, to say nothing of that never-to-be-forgotten game of "Gimme." This year there is to be a special Turkey Stag orchestra, and the Four Jacks will delight all with their singing of Christmas carols. The big feature, of course, will be Charles Marchand and his Habitant Troubadours, of Montreal, who will sing the happy songs in French and English. Santa Claus is expected to talk to the youngsters over the radio. Speaking of radio the idea is to present the whole programme over the radio for the benefit of those who cannot attend but who own a radio of their own.

CHRISTMAS MAIL SHOULD BE POSTED WITHOUT DELAY

Mail for Old Country Should be Mailed by Saturday This Week to Avoid Disappointment. Some Helpful Hints on Mailing Christmas Mail.

The desirability of early mailing of Christmas cards, letters and parcels can not be over-emphasized. The local postmaster suggests that those sending parcels mail them well in advance of the last minute rush to allow for possible delays during the busy Christmas season. It is estimated that in Toronto 40,000 bags of mail will be handled daily during the week before Christmas, the postmaster says, and all other points will be correspondingly busy. By mailing parcels well in advance the chances of disappointing relatives and friends may be avoided. Sticker labels reading, "Please do not open till Christmas" may be affixed to the parcels and they can then be sent on in lots of time so that there will be no chance of them not arriving in lots of time for Christmas.

The last steamer which will deliver parcels before Christmas for Great Britain is the Duchess of Atholl, which sails from St. John, N.B., on Dec. 6th, so that parcel mail to catch that boat should be mailed at Timmins not later than 11 a.m. on Monday, Dec. 2nd. It would be safer to mail not later than Saturday to be sure of the mail reaching the Old Country in time for Christmas delivery.

Parcels for delivery in the United States should be mailed in Timmins not later than Dec. 9th, says Postmaster E. H. King, who adds that such parcels are sent to the United States border customs offices, where, owing to the increased volume of business at the Christmas period they may be delayed from ten days to two weeks.

Christmas mail for the Yukon should be posted before Dec. 10th; for British Columbia and Alberta, by Dec. 14th; for Manitoba, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, on or before Dec. 17th.

Quebec and Ontario mail for Christmas delivery should be posted not later than Dec. 18th. The early dates for Ontario and Quebec, says Postmaster King, are necessary because of the congestion that may result during the last few days owing to the tremendous volume of mail gathering at the distributing centres such as Montreal and Toronto. Toronto alone expects to handle seven and a half million outgoing letters a day, in addition to the millions coming in from outside points.

Among the suggestions made by Postmaster King are the following:— Wrap your parcels well in strong, brown paper. Tie securely with strong cord, and make certain that both the name and address of both the sender and the addressee are on the outside of each parcel sent out. Mail early to avoid damage and disappointment.


