JOSEPH PAQUETTE KILLED BY EARLY TRAIN MONDAY

Town Some Time, Meets Sad Death Near Schumacher This Week

On Monday morning between Schumacher and South Porcupine a man was killed on the T. & N. O. tracks, gine or getting before the oncoming train. Later, the unfortunate man was identified as Joseph Paquette, aged about fifty, who has been in town for some time making his home with J. Hudon recently. It will perhaps never be known just how the accident occurred. It may be that Paquette stepped in front of the train, but in that case he must have come from the side opposite to that of the engineer who saw no signs of the man until the train apparently threw him forward. The possibility that the unfortunate had been riding on the front of the engine is suggested by the South Porcupine correspondent of The Advance elsewhere in this issue in referring to the accident. An inquest was held this week at Timmins. Coroner F. C. Evans conducting the enquiry.

The late Joseph Paquette had been in Timmins for some time past but was not widely known being of a quiet and retiring disposition.
