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



The reason is the danger created for the linesmen who have to E. Hill climb the pole. The posters are usu-F. Feldman ally put up with tacks and these tacks form a decided danger for the men who have to climb the poles. The linesmen using the spurs to go up or down the poles are in constant danger of a serious or perhaps fatal fall through tacks on the poles. The spurs striking these tacks are turned and may slip down the pole with the ever-constant possibility of an accident that all would regret. The linesmen who strikes his spurs very energetically is also in danger of the spur being deflected by the tack and hitting the other leg with undesirable results. The power and phone companies have been good-tempered about the use of their poles, but every once in a while they have made energetic protest. This has been wholly on behalf of the safety of their linesmen. The fact is, as any linesman knows, that tacks and nails on the poles, add so materially to the hazard of the work of climbing that no one who stops to consider the question will blame the companies for strictly enforcing their rights to prosecute those illegally using the poles. It should be remembered also that the companies have no time or opportunity to examine bills posted to see whether their posting constitutes a danger or not. It seems to be a case where the only practical way is to enforce the regulation altogether forbidding the use of the poles for bill posting.
