Parents and pupils should study their reports and note any signs of weakness which may be corrected by special study and care.

The reports should be signed by the parents and returned the first week of school which re-opens on Monday, January 6th.

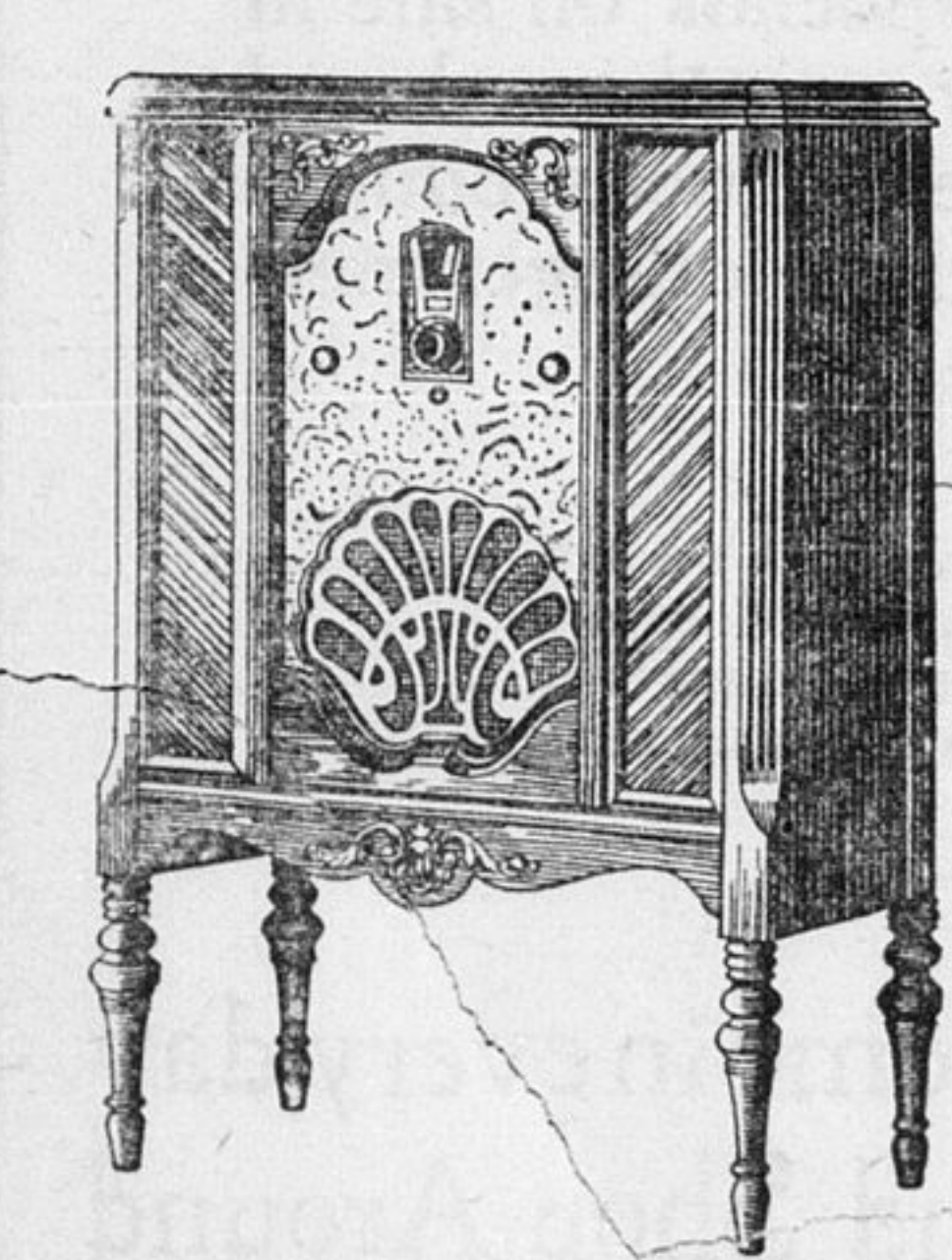
