

MAY BE NEW COURSE FOR DOG RACE ON SATURDAY

Unless Snow Falls New Course Will be Taken. If Snow Comes Before Race the Regular Course Will be Followed.

Weather conditions have made probable some changes in the course for the Porcupine Dog Race on Saturday of this week, March 1st. If it does not snow before the race a new course will be necessary. This new course will be as follows:—Starting at Moyses's corner, Third Avenue, going up Pine street, then down Kirby to Preston street, then along Preston to Main Avenue, then down Main to the river and across the bridge, follow the road as indicated by the arrows, turning to the right till the Transmission line is reached, then turn left and follow Transmission line, then down Transmission line to point marked by arrow, turning across country to Cook's Camp, Road and over bridge again, up Wilson to Cameron street, turning off Cameron street up Hollinger Lane and Fourth Avenue to finish at Moyses's corner. If it snows before the race the old course over the "back road" to South Porcupine and back by highway, will be followed.
