On the other hand there is sympathy with the dealers who may have stocks on hand, and no one wishes to interfere with business or with fun, but it surely is evident that unless some method may be adopted to stop the ridiculous abuse of the use of firecrackers the public can scarcely be expected to coolly accept a nuisance danger. It may be, as some of the dealers suggest, that the sale of fireworks may be restricted to a few days and the serious abuses eliminated. In that case the public will be quite ready to have fireworks sold and used. But even the good-natured long-suffering public has some rights that should be respected, and certainly there should be no repetition of the annoyance and danger caused in the last few years by the abuse of the use of firecrackers.

The danger to the public from speeding, reckless driving and refreshments are on the proand other breaches of the traffic rules was impressed upon the town council on Monday. It is to be hoped that adequate protection will be given the public in this matter. The growth of the number of automobiles in use seems to have tempted people to forget that even to-day the great majority of people are still only pedestrians. The safety of the pedestrian accordingly should be the first consideration. The pedestrian may not have as large an influence as the motorist but the number in the class is large enough to warrant more attention to those who still elect to walk whether by preference or by force of circumstances. A serious accident will bring home the necessity for care on the part of the motorists and for strict enforcement of the protecting laws. It seems foolish however to wait for tragedy before guarding the safety of the public. Speeding and reckless driving are reported as common already this year. Now is the time to curb the dangerous practices.
