DOUBLE CLEAN-UP IN TOWN ON BREACH OF L.C.A. CASES

Both the Provincial and the Town Police Have Several Cases Each on Liquor Charges at Police Court Here.

Evidently both the provincial police and the town police are out to make a clean-up of those disregarding the Ontario Liquor Control Act. The town police this week had several liquor cases before the court. O. Henderson, of the Queen's hotel, was charged with selling. His case was remanded for a week. Tony Kowaski, Fourth avenue, nearly opposite the police station, was charged with selling, and his case was also remanded for a week. Sam Stamas, on a charge of having liquor not on his permit was fined \$100.00 and costs. D. Augustino was charged with supplying liquor to a minor, as a result of one of the town police raids. He was also charged in connection with immorality alleged to be permitted in his house. Remand was made in these cases to next week.
The provincial police had three charges of breaches of the liquor act before the court. Two of these dismissed, but Officer Hartlieb's charge against James Mackay of having liquor not on his permit resulted in a fine of \$200.00 and costs or three months. It was expected this morning the three months' alternative would be taken as the money for the fine was not forthcoming.
For driving a car without the necessary license a lady was fined \$10.00 and costs. She was learning to drive but had failed to secure the necessary beginner's permit.
F. Edwards, who came in to town from a lumber camp while the camp was under quarantine for smallpox, was picked up here by the police and on appearance in court on the charge of breaking quarantine, was fined \$100.00 and costs or three months. He will likely have to take the term. The case should be taken as a warning to all as to the seriousness of breaking quarantine. If the safety of others

will not induce people to observe quarantine, perhaps the penalties imposed for breaches of quarantine may restrain those who are tempted to endanger the public in this way.
A wife desertion case was withdrawn. A man facing a vagrancy charge and a charge of theft got off on the latter but on the vagrancy count was given 60 days.
Several wage cases against a lumber firm were remanded for a week.
A remand of a week in the case of the charge of perjury against A. Robitaille was made.
