LATE JUDGE E. SANFORD HAD DAUGHTER IN KIRKLAND LAKE

He was born in Knoxville, Tennessee, and was a graduate of the University of Tenessee and of Harvard. Before he was nominated as a associate justice, he had practiced law in his native state and was a Federal judge.

TRIED AND TESTED RECIPE FOR CARAMEL CUSTARD

A domestic science expert recommends this recipe for caramel custard: 1 tall can Borden's St. Charles Milk with enough water to make 1 quart

teaspoon salt. 1 teaspoon vanilla. cup sugar.

teaspoon nutmeg. Gradually sift sugar into a hot skillet, shaking the skillet vigorously all the time to prevent burning. The sugar should melt about as fast as it is sifted into the pan. When it turns to an amber colour (a light resin colour) set on back of stove and add milk, being careful that milk does not bubble over, as is liable on account of the high 19 temperature of sugar. As soon as the sugar is melted in the milk, add mixture gradually to eggs slightly beaten Add the salt and flavouring to eggs and milk mixture. Bake in custard cups in a moderate oven.
