#### Have You Secured Your Auto License for 1930?

Last week The Advance called special attention to the fact that all licenses, markers, etc., for the operation of cars and trucks are required now. Anyone without the 1930 plates or credentials is liable to a fine. A number were caught through undue delay in securing their radio licenses. The Advance is anxious that none of its readers should waste their money and convenience by being brought out after being in the year's motor licenses. Cars are now being brught out after being in the garage for the winter. It is preferable to have the necessary licenses, markers, etc., for 1930, before the car comes out rather than after using it once or twice. No one can lawfully operate a motor car without the 1930 licenses and markers. To attempt to do so is to take an unnecessary risk.
