Well-Known and Popular Prospector of the North Dies on Way to Timmins by Dog Team.

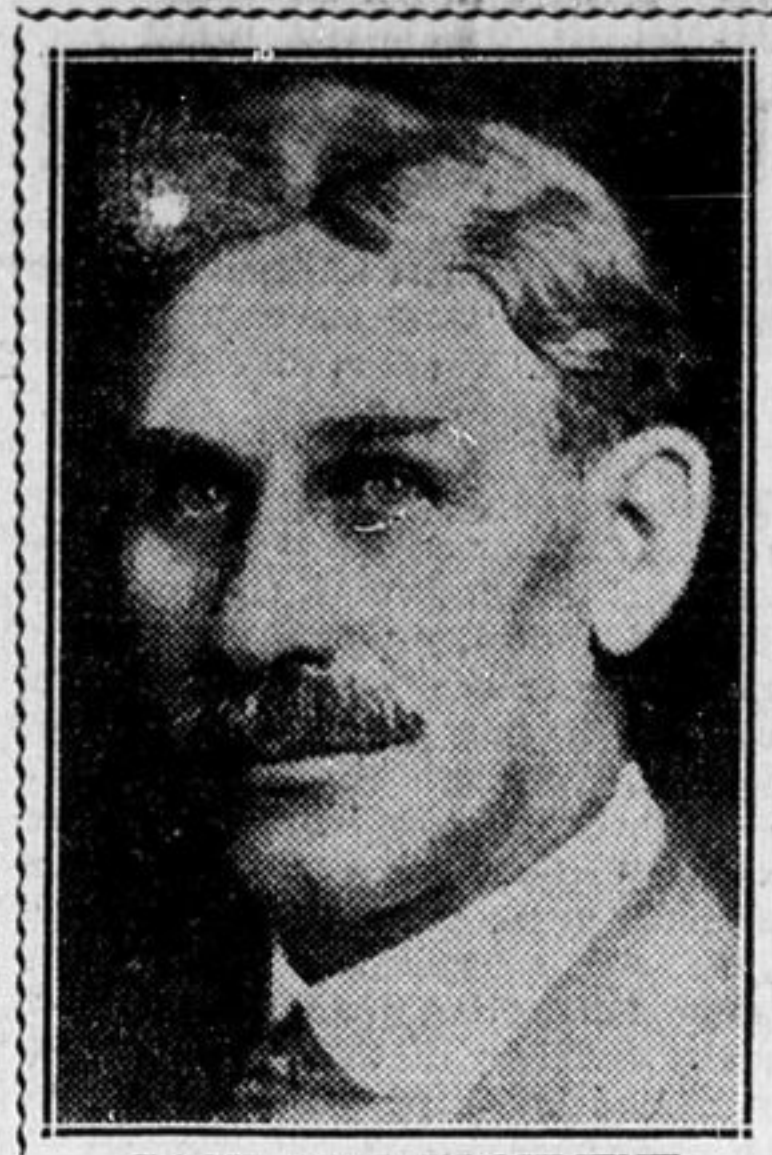
The North Land lost one of its best known and most popular old-time prospectors in the death of T. A. Jamieson on Friday morning.

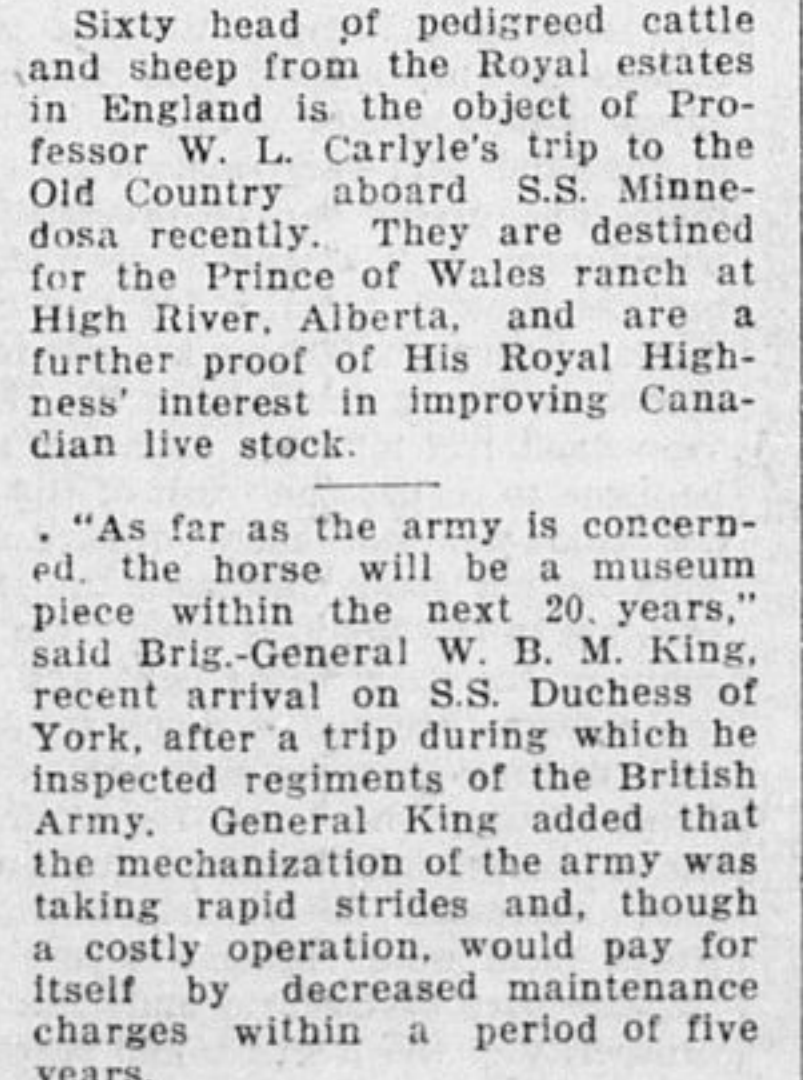
