

The Ontario government are willing to co-operate in the construction of the trans-Canada highway and are anxious to see that it should be completed a as early a date as possible.

This work is not a local or provincial work but a national work in which the whole of Canada is interested. There woul dbe very little local travel from the eastern provinces to the prairie provinces and the West.

If the Dominion government are willing to co-operate in this work and assist the province in undertaking it the work could be proceeded with at once but to date the Dominion government have declined to assume any responsibility in connection with this

In the province of Ontario the road would be cut through hundreds of miles of territory where there is practically no settlement and there would be no local trade and through a country where the construction would be ex-

tremely expensive. In the United States the federal government make contributions to such work but until something of the kind is done in Canada. I do not think there is much prospect of the work being WELL-KNOWN HAILEYBURY proceeded with.
