GRAVEL AND SAND — AND PLACER

In the weekly letter, "The Canadian Legion in the Porcupine" the secretary-treasurer of the Timmins branch this week again calls attention to the unfortunate fact that many returned soldiers are out of employment while to their hardship in this particular they have added the irritation of seeing men of alien birth in full employment and prosperity. It can not be denied, despite some partisan political propaganda, that there is serious unemployment conditions not only in the North but generally throughout Canada. It is true that the Dominion Government's immigration policy, or lack of policy, is responsible for the present conditions. At the same time, there is little use in calling attention to that fact except with the hope of avoiding similar poor policy in the future. In the meantime present facts and conditions must be faced. The effort should be centred on dealing with the matter so that the country and the Canadian people should suffer as little as possible. It would be a good thing for the cause of justice and fairplay, and so of advantage to Canada and Canadians, if some method along the lines suggested by the secretary-treasurer of the Legion could be followed, whereby the preference in the matter of employment could be given to returned soldiers and other specially loyal Canadians. This is the attitude that has been adopted by the head officials of all the mines and most of the other large industries in the North Land. There are conditions that perhaps make it difficult always to follow out such a preference but it's an idea that is always well worth keeping to the front. It should be noted that some of those usually referred to as "aliens," on account of their foreign birth or foreign nationality are not aliens at all, but have become good Canadian citizens. There are others, however, who make use of the prosperity they have found in this country to advocate the abolition of the forms of government and religious beliefs that former generations of

British people gave their lives to maintain. It does seem unfortunate and undesirable that the real alien—with ideas foreign to all British ideals and hopes—should enjoy prosperity while the men who fought for the maintenance of the Empire should not know where to find their daily bread. Last week in Sudbury the un-British attitude of some aliens was shown by an attempt to break up a peaceable assembly of loyal Canadians. There was the further un-British announcement by the aliens that hereafter they would not permit any but their own type of alien to address a meeting in Sudbury. If anyone is to starve in this country or to be in want, it does seem that it would be better to have the disloyal in this position rather than returned soldiers or other good Canadians. In the past the mines and other industries have shown the right attitude and no doubt between the industries and the Legion and others, plans will be perfected for the benefit for all concerned.

Last week The Advance published a three-inch editorial note in reference to the stand taken by J. A. Bradette, M.P., on the Trans-Canada highway resolution in the House of Commons. Last night The Advance received a letter from Mr. Bradette that looks like a three-column reply. On account of the length of the letter and the fact that it was received just before press time, it can not be published this week but will appear in next issue. Of course, suitable answer will be made by The Advance, though equal space will not be practical. In the meantime, it may not be out of place to say that Mr. Bradette might economize on space if he would refrain from answering charges not made. It does seem to The Advance that Mr. Bradette should be able to explain why he voted against the Trans-Canada highway resolution, and yet not take as much as three columns to do the explaining. Space in a newspaper is of some value, and Mr. Bradette is being generously used in this respect. He is receiving this special favour because he has been so fair and courteous himself, and has shown so much earnestness in the service of the public in the past. All this, however does not alter the fact that a single vote should not need too much explaining.

In reviewing the pleasing mystery novel, "Streets of Shadow," by Leslie McFarland, The Advance last week suggested that this talented North Land author might well write a novel depicting the life and spirit of the North. In a note this week to The Advance the author thanks this reviewer for his review, but modestly pleads that he is waiting to attain the superior craftsmanship that such a subject deserves before he attempts the North Land novel. Those who read "Streets of Shadow" will note a skill and effectiveness with the pen that will tempt to the belief that it is modesty rather than craftsmanship that is holding back the North Land novel.

Death of Murray McGee Reported From Ottawa

Mrs. McGee received a telegram last night from Ottawa informing her that her son, Murray McGee, had died in the city yesterday. No details in regard to the sad news were given, but the death was sudden and unexpected, as Murray McGee had not previously been ill. He had just come over to Ottawa from New York, his sisters being in the capital city. Mrs. McGee was well-known in the town and district, having been in newspaper work here and also on the staff of the brewery warehouse as government inspector for a time. He was for many years a resident of Timmins. The sympathy of all will be extended to Mrs. McGee and family in their sad and sudden bereavement.

Accident on Highway Opposite McIntyre Sunday

While driving his car to South Porcupine early Sunday morning Lionel Blenvu had the misfortune to collide with a post on the road opposite the McIntyre mill. The car was badly smashed up. It turned right around and fell over on its side in the collision. Reni Forgette who was in the car at the time was cut about the head and face, and Mrs. Tounganeau who was also in the car with her husband, suffered severe shock from the accident, but was taken home after the accident. The accident occurred about 6.30 a.m. The police were promptly on the scene and did all possible to assist in caring for those in the accident. Reports of those in the accident sustaining fractured legs and other injuries do not seem to be founded on fact, according to the information of the officials.

The Cochrane town council at its last session passed a resolution expressing the great loss sustained by the town of Cochrane and the district generally in the death of Otto Thorning, and extending sincere sympathy to Mrs. Thorning and family in their bereavement.
