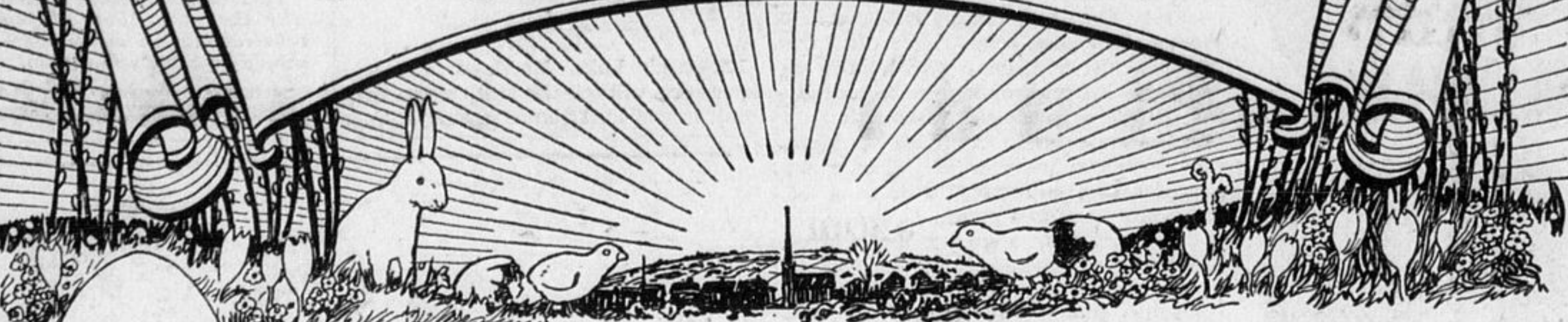

PRESIDENT TIMMINS SAYS MINE WAITS FOR T.&N.O.

Directors Re-elected at Annual General Meeting of the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines Last Week at Montreal.

The chief item noted at the annual general meeting of the shareholders of the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines last Friday at Montreal was a statement by N. A. Timmins, the president, in regard to the T. & N. O. The president is quoted as telling the shareholders that until the Ontario Government decides to extend the Timmins branch of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway to the Kamiskotia district, a distance of about 17 miles, operations on the Hollinger property at Kamiskotia will remain at a standstill. The hope was expressed that the Government will come to a decision in the matter before long. The directors of the mine had offered to make a substantial contribution towards meeting any operating loss on the proposed branch line, notwithstanding their opinion that the extension of the railway was a government enterprise, it was stated, according to the reports of the meeting given in despatches from Montreal.

The annual reports of the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines, Limited, were read at the meeting and were duly adopted. These reports have already been reviewed at some length in The Advance.

The same directors as last year were duly elected to the board of directors. These are as follows:—N. A. Timmins, J. B. Holden, L. H. Timmins, J. R. Timmins, Hon. W. L. McDougall, Wilson Bell and Leo. H. Timmins.
