TWO MEN INJURED BY AIR BLAST AT KIRKLAND LAKE

Two men, H. James, aged 37 years, were badly injured at the Kirkland Lake Gold Mine, Kirkland Lake, on Wednesday of last week when they were struck by a fall of rock caused by an air blast, near the bottom of the shaft. Gosselin was the most seriously injured, having one of his hips severely crushed. His condition is considered as critical. James had one leg and one rib broken. Both men are married. Gosselin's family live at the Homer Mine, while James' family resides at Cornwall, England. The men were taken to the Kirkland Lake hospital where they are doing as well as can be expected.

UPPER NOTCH POWER TO BE COMPLETED THIS AUTUMN

The Halleyburian last week says:—"Work at the power development at the Upper Notch, commenced last year by the Canada Northern Power Corporation, is going on well, according to report from the scene of operations this week. It is expected that the project will be completed this fall, when the power lines will be connected up with those running from the Quinze and serving the mining fields of both Ontario and Quebec. Mr. B. V. Harrison, general manager of the Power Corporation, with W. A. Gordon, K. C. Messrs N. McAulay, W. S. Blackwell, A. MacLean and J. J. Dickenson, of Cobalt visited the Notch on Saturday last. Hennessy Brothers, of Halleybury, have taken the contract of cutting out the right-of-way for the power lines, which will cross Lake Temiskaming at the Old Mission and run through Ville Marie. Work has already been commenced on the Ontario side."

WOOD FROM HEAD TO HEEL

The following paragraph is from Canadian Forest and Outdoors, the journal of the Canadian Forestry Association:—"Wood is a tremendous factor in the manufacture of clothing. In the weaving of cloth, both cotton and woollen, and silk, wood is used extensively to make shuttles, bobbins, spoolheads, loom frames; the wooden shuttle is essential in the manufacture of these materials, for the longer it is used the smoother it gets, and it is light, hard and tough. Certain machines used in hat making are 95 per cent wood, and wood is employed very widely in the manufacture of felt hats. We are depending upon the forest more and more for clothing, rayon silk fabrics, and those manufactured of cellophane. Milady's dainty heels are shod with wood, and wood is used for the shank of the shoe and for plugs in some classes of footwear. The old wooden sabot is still used in Europe. As time goes on wood enters more and more into the machinery of our daily living."
