Timmins Man Suing Dome Man Following Assault

Following injuries received at one of the hockey matches at Iroquois Falls last winter Louis Silver, pulp dealer, of Timmins, has cases in both the criminal and the civil courts against a cook from the Dome named Solland. The story in connection with the cases is given as follows in despatches sent out last week from Iroquois Falls and published in several outside newspapers. The despatches read as follows:—

"The last hockey season is little more than a memory now, but its repercussions continue to be heard and one of them is before two courts awaiting settlement. This particular case arises out of one of the senior games played here during the winter between Iroquois Falls Eskimos and their South Porcupine rivals, and as a result of an incident then a Norwegian cook from the Dome mine, named Solland, not only is held on \$400 cash bail to appear on a charge of assault, but is also named defendant in a civil action for damages brought against him by Louis Silver, pulp buyer of Timmins.

"Silver is alleged to have had his nose broken in four places when he was butted by Solland's head shortly after the third period of this game had commenced. It is claimed Solland grabbed the other man by the lapels of his coat and then assaulted him, and for this alleged attack he subsequently appeared before Magistrate E. R. Tucker in police court here and was committed for trial. Then Silver instituted civil proceedings against him, suing him for \$5,500 damages.

"The latter case was to have come before the Supreme Court sittings at Cochrane last week, but Mr. Justice Garrow granted the plea of Dean Kester, appearing for Solland, that the action should be traversed until the criminal case had been disposed of. It is not yet determined whether Solland will elect to go before Judge Caron without a jury, or wait until the sessions, which are to open in Cochrane on June 10 next."

Mayor Fred Sullivan of Cobalt is urging that the transmission line from the new power source north of Cochrane be run along the T. & N. O. so as to serve Cobalt and other towns along the line and thus reduce the price of power to the industries at these places.

Driving Car Over Walk Causes Unusual Noise

On Tuesday between twelve midnight and one o'clock Wednesday morning a most unusual noise was heard for blocks around and attracted the attention of all anywhere near the accident. The police who were inside the town hall and without either a door or a window open plainly heard the disturbance and immediately went out to investigate. They were unable at first to locate the exact spot from which the noise originated, but eventually traced it to the corner of Pine street and Fourth avenue. After considerable enquiry and investigation it was found that the noise was caused by a car being rapidly driven across the sidewalk at the Goldfields hotel property. The auto apparently was travelling at a rapid rate and it looks as if the driver did not see where he was going. In any event the car went bumping across the vacant piece of land alongside the Goldfields hotel lot. The noise heard was that made when the car first struck the sidewalk, and the second "explosion," as it seemed to be, was when the car again hit the roadway after its rough ride across the walk and the vacant land. There seems to be a general opinion among those who noted the accident that the driver of the car did not turn sharply enough in making the turn and that when he eventually realized that he could not see the roadway and was really unable to avoid some sort of accident or misadventure, he simply put on speed and hurried away.

The police were very promptly on the scene after they heard the terrific noise made. It sounded partly like a boiler shop and partly like a hunting party with the element of lack of noise quite predominant. When the police arrived there was no one in sight and no one knew the people in the car. The police are searching for the accused and have picked up a couple of clues.

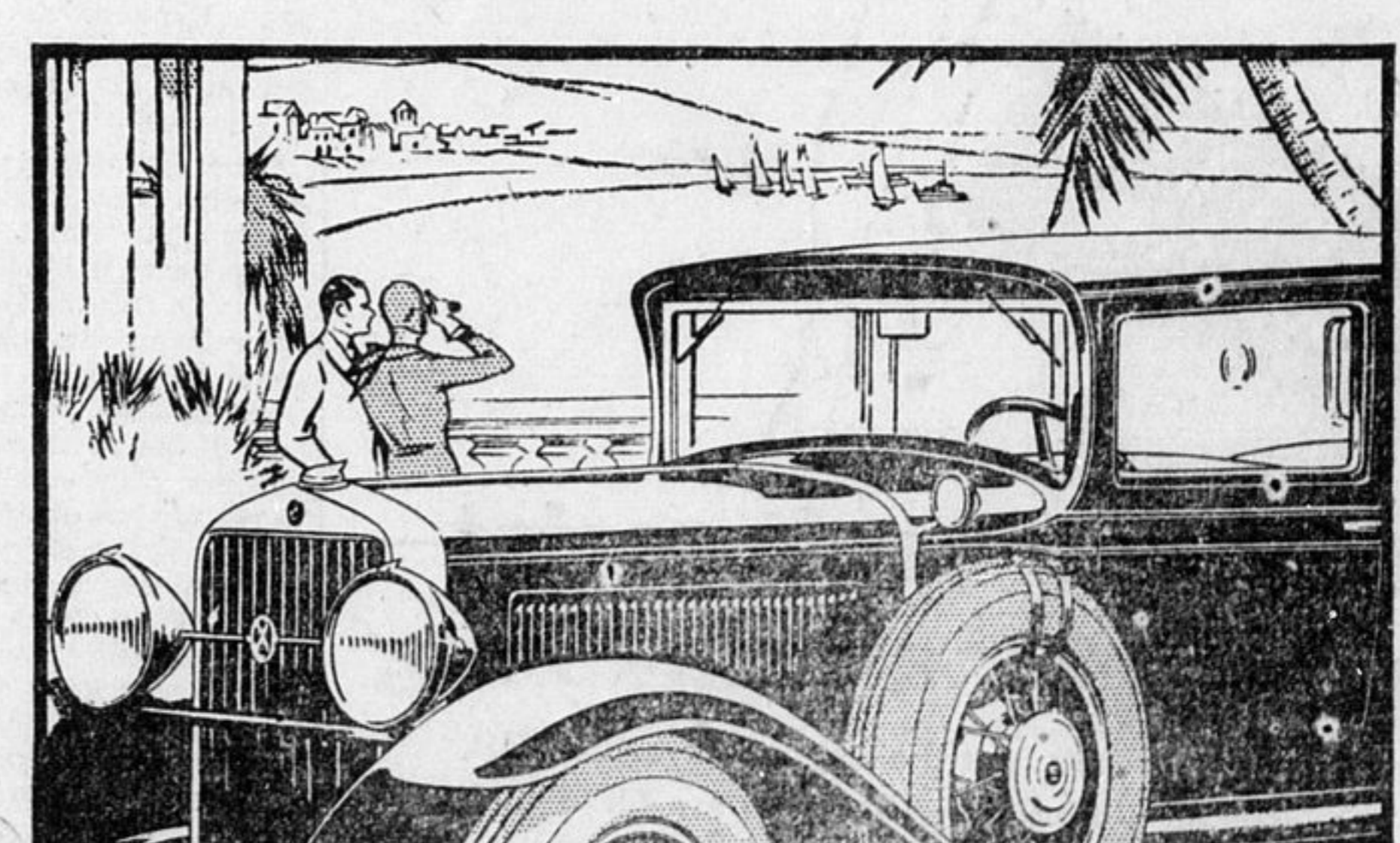
