The executive and entertainment committee are to meet at the president's office at 7 p.m. on Thursday, May 1st, to arrange the 24th May sports, etc. Comrade McLaughlin had quite a nice programme, for an example, to show the boys on Monday last, which as Comrade McLaughlin says, is open for suggestions.

Our "Jazz" or "Blow and Bang" band had a try-out on Monday at the general meeting under the able conductor Comrade Curtis. Bill blew so much on the saxophone that the baton of Comrade Curtis was blown out of trim. The conductor finally settling down and allowing Bill to blow as hard as he liked. The last I saw of Bill was that he was asking Archie how to put in the "G's" in the kitchen while the rest of the boys cleaned up the dishes. The boys ought to feel proud to have music for their washing-up.

Anyhow, putting all jokes to one side, the boys, with a little more training, will make in time, a "good Legion orchestra."

PROPOSE BOY SCOUT CAMP WEST OF SMOOTH ROCK FALLS

Boy Scouts in Timmins and district will no doubt be interested in the following paragraph from the last issue of The Northern Tribune, of Kapuskasing. The proposal of the Kapuskasing newspaper is at least worth careful consideration. The Northern Tribune says:—

"For several years past very successful Boy Scout camps have been held at Departure Lake, just west of Smooth Rock Falls. Now that the town has secured a long-term lease of lots on this delightful camping ground, and is sub-leasing lots to citizens who desire to erect summer cottages there, it will become more of a favourite. On his recent trip Hon. Mr. Finlayson gave assurance that the road to the lake would be much improved, so that it will be conveniently accessible to motorists.

"The editor of The Northern Tribune has speculated on the possibility of this year holding a real district Boy Scout camp at Departure Lake. If it could be managed, it would be a fine, healthful outing for many Temiskaming lads who would thus be brought into close association. An experienced Scout leader who has had experience in handling a large district camp is now available. Many merchants in the various towns would be glad to donate prizes to be striven for by the boys, and the well-known genius of the Scout movement for keeping Scouts on their toes in friendly rivalry could be brought into full play.

"It should be possible to bring Scouts to this camp from Hearst, Kapuskasing, Cochrane, Iroquois Falls and Timmins, and perhaps several other places. The Timmins boys could make a fine trip of it down the Mattagami River by canoe, in charge of expert canoeists. Motor friends would gladly transport the boys from all the other towns to the camp, and back home. All the necessary equipment would also be loaned by friends of the movement; and visitors could come along and inspect the lay-out and observe the boys

under their splendid Scout discipline. "If this suggestion is favoured, there is three months' time to perfect plans for its success. May we hope that friends of the Boy Scouts will discuss the possibilities and come to an early decision as to whether the district camp can be attempted this year? Once started, it would become a great annual affair."
