

CASE AGAINST KRANKOVICH TO BE HEARD AT SOUTH END

Charge Under the Employment Agents' Act. Other Cases at Police Court This Week. One Man Involved in Charge of Assaulting Small Girl.

At police court here on Wednesday this week Ivan Krankovich faced a charge of an offence under the Employment Agents' Act. His solicitor, Dean Kester, asked that the case might be tried in the Tisdale police court, his client being a resident of Tisdale, and the court agreed to the change of venue.

Another serious case to come before this week's police court is the charge against Gregorie Cretorie of assault-

ing a little girl of seven years of age. The alleged offence is said to have occurred at about one o'clock on Saturday morning. A gentleman living on Middleton avenue heard some noise outside his house and going out found the accused and the little girl, according to the story given to the police. The little girl had her coat torn and her face was bruised and bleeding. The Middleton avenue man notified the police, keeping both man and child at his house until the police arrived, when Cretorie was taken into custody. When arrested Cretorie had a bottle of beer in his possession and had evidently been drinking. He was fined in police court this week for illegal possession of liquor, the fine being \$100.00 and costs or three months. The father of the little girl laid the charge of indecent assault, and the case will be called this afternoon here.

At yesterday's court a charge of reckless driving resulted in one man being fined \$20.00 and costs. Another reckless driving charge was remanded for two weeks. A charge of allowing a dog to run at large was similarly remanded as were also one charge of

false pretences and two charges of breach of the L.C.A. Two charges of assault preferred by one man against whom the defendants had preferred counter charges resulted in the complainant in the one case being fined \$20.00 and costs while the two charges he had laid were dismissed. The cases seemed to arise from a row that developed from an attempt to collect some rent. Provincial Officer Hartlieb had one man before the court for illegally having liquor, a fine of \$100.00 and costs being imposed.

TRUCK AND CAR COLLIDE ON SOUTH PORCUPINE HIGHWAY

Much Damage Done When Heavy Vehicles Collide. Many From South Porcupine at Shriners' Convention. Other South End News.

A large truck belonging to the Taylor Hardware and a Chrysler car are in the South End Garage here, mute testimony to the terrific impact there must have been when they collided on the Timmins-South Porcupine highway on Tuesday evening around five o'clock. The accident occurred about one-quarter mile from town, just about at the same place where the car hit the steam roller last year. It is said that shortly beyond this place there is a very bad bump in the road. The truck has the rear hind wheel badly driven in on the right side. The mud-guards on this side are practically torn off and the panel of the door is also partly torn off. But it is the view of the front half of the car that makes one realize how lucky the occupants were to es-

cape with only minor cuts. The bumpers are a tangled mass. The radiator is flattened out like a pancake and we believe was picked up some twenty-five yards away from where the car was. The two front wheels are a wreck. We were told that the hub of one had to be wedged out of the side of the truck where it had become imbedded by the impact. The engine is considerably damaged and all the glass is gone from the windshield. Mr. H. M. Wilson came along shortly after the collision and helped to rush the injured men to the Presbyterian hospital here. The case was taken in charge by Provincial Traffic Officer Morrow, of Porcupine Jct., who happened to be patrolling this section just at the time of the accident. He also took one man to the hospital. The driver of the truck was Zephrin St. Pierre, of Timmins, and the occupants of the car were Andy Vareddy, of Timmins, and B. Cousineau, of Schumacher. They were all able to be released from the hospital on the same evening which they entered. There are many conflicting accounts as to just how the accident occurred but at any rate they must have been going at a good rate for such a terrific bang to be given both vehicles. One of the participants was jailed we believe after his release from the hospital and more definite particulars will probably come to light in Thursday's police court.
