

### FIRE DOES DAMAGE SUNDAY AT THE DAHER BUILDING

Heavy Loss on Furniture. Fire Confined to Upstairs. Thought to be Caused by Wiring. Water and Smoke Damage to Stocks in Store.

Fire did considerable damage at the Daher building, 15 and 15 1/2 Pine street south, on Sunday afternoon, the loss to the furniture, furnishings, etc., being around \$2500.00, with only \$500.00 insurance carried. The damage to the building and to the stocks in the store downstairs is not estimated yet, but is covered by insurance, there being \$6,000.00 insurance on the building and \$11,000.00 on the stocks.

The alarm was sent in by phone at 2:45 p.m. and the fire brigade made a very speedy response. When they arrived the fire appeared to be all over the upstairs part of the building and the smoke was very dense all through the apartments. Three lines of hose were immediately put to play on the fire and after half an hour's good work the brigade had the fire out, though they kept at work for another hour to watch for any further outbreak in the partitions.

This week the Fire Marshal who was in the camp on other business made an inspection of the premises. The insurance adjuster coming here also inspected the scene of the fire. Both of them were of the opinion after having an electrical expert go over the building that fire was caused from the electrical wiring. There was no one in the apartments at the time the fire commenced so the fire was able to gain considerable headway before it was discovered and an alarm given.

Morris Daher, who was on his holidays, was in Sudbury at the time and the news was wired to him of the fire. He started back on Monday morning by auto and spent sixteen long and hard hours on the road, reaching here on Monday night late, plastered with mud and about all in from the hard trip.

The firemen were complimented by both the Fire Marshal and the adjuster on the effective work done to confine the fire to the upstairs of the building where it started. There was no fire downstairs, the loss to stocks being from smoke and water. The upstairs part of the building was badly damaged, while the furniture and furnishings are practically a total loss.

#### MERGER PENDING OF TEN BIG MINING COMPANIES

According to information given out in Toronto negotiations are understood to be pending which will involve the amalgamation of some ten mining companies of both Canadian and United States origin. The arrangement, which will include five Canadian and five American companies, headed by Tri-Metal Mines, Ltd., is expected to be completed within the next two or three days. The American concerns include Tri-Metal Mines, Ltd.; Aco Mining Company, Arizona Lead and Copper Company, Le Noir Gold Mines Corporation and Butte-Madison Mines Corporation. The names of the Canadian companies will not be revealed until negotiations have been completed. The merger will result in the consolidation of considerable capital, thus ensuring a constructive programme of expansion for a number of important properties in the two countries.
