The Canadian Legion in the Porcupine

Application forms are to hand this week from John Coyne, South Porcupine, James McDonnell, Dome Mines, J. L. Picton, Dome Mines, O. Chenier, Timmins, W. T. Brenton, Timmins and F. E. Stuby, Timmins. This is coming ahead in fine style. Comrade Parsons has to be credited with the first three, President Neame, Comrade Southam and myself with one each. We grow slowly but surely. Comrade Parsons dropped in Saturday with 100 donations, three applications, and dues for three members. We are grateful for the splendid support from the Dome and South Porcupine, towards the branch, and I am afraid we shall never be out of Comrade Parsons' debt for his splendid work on behalf of the Legion.

We were able to do some relief work this last week amongst some ex-soldiers, who were homeless, friendless, hungry and without means of livelihood. Through our relief fund we brought sunshine into the lives of these poor devils, whose future looked dark indeed, and assisted them to get employment. One of these poor fellows remarked that we ought to think ourselves lucky in the Porcupine, as he had seen thousands out of work in the cities. Thousands clamouring for work, for food, and many families starving! To see the look on these poor devils' faces when we gave them the means to get food and lodging, and help them to get work, was worth all the hard knocks the officers of this branch get at times. It brought out the Legion in its real light, a refuge in this hard old world's storms, real feeling for unfortunate comrades in their hour of need, a refuge where good sound common sense is used, to help those who cannot help themselves.

Yes, we get hard knocks at times, often unjustly through people not knowing the facts. We were asked a short while ago to help a comrade who was in good work, earning a good wage, who had unfortunately got into difficulties. Owing to the state of our relief fund at that time, we felt unable to hand him what he required from our relief fund. We took up the matter with our Provincial Command who promised to give his case all the help they could. They sent us papers to fill in with all particulars of the case, and papers for this comrade to fill in, with the reminder that help would sure be forthcoming if the papers were filled in and signed by this comrade. This comrade filled in the papers but refused to sign them. I have the papers at present still unsigned. This comrade met the executive committee of the branch, and was advised to sign the papers. He would not do as the executive wished, so therefore the case was dropped. The usual line of story got around, that we had refused to help a comrade, that we had money for relief, but we were not giving it out.

as we should. I trust some of those who were so quick to condemn the Legion will read this article and get the real truth of the matter. Our relief goes as far as possible to those poor devils out of work, and to assist the families of comrades who are sick. We figure a man in work should be at least able to look after his home, and if he does strike adverse conditions we are always ready to give him advice, and help, also smooth out his difficulties. We are dispensing public money, members dues, and we have have to be very careful what, and who we assist, as the finger of scorn is quickly pointed at us. We have not turned down a single deserving case since last October; in fact, we have given help to suspended members, to men who were quick to find fault with an organization that they could have joined, when they had the means, but were not man enough to do so. We bore no malice for the past. If investigation showed that they were in need of help, they got that help, from the relief fund of the Legion. Some of the comrades we have helped have joined the branch, their letters thanking us for our help in the time of need, asking us if they could join the branch, as they were now able to look after themselves, and would be proud to join the branch if we would take them, are something that the finger of scorn cannot reach, something that makes us proud that we as members of that world-wide League, The British Empire Service League, of which the Canadian Legion is a part; proud that we can help those who cannot help themselves; proud to fight again, yes, fight for the right to work, and live where the Union Jack still flutters proudly in the breeze. We had no fear over there, fighting for the good old flag, and we have no fear at all, fighting, yes, fighting for the ex-soldier and his dependents, under the same old flag, that thousands gave their lives for. It is said that the pen is far mightier than the sword, and one thing it is much lighter than the sword, and has proved to be very effective in a frontal attack, in the times of peace, when the livelihood of the ex-soldier was at stake, and some people ready to deprive him of that livelihood. In the future when might again starts to be right, the pen will prove a ready weapon, where the livelihood of the ex-soldier is at stake.
