During the past week J. A. Bradette member for this riding in the House of Commons ,made two addresses in the House. One reproduced in greater part in this issue was a rather lengthy one, while the other one, delivered last Friday was a much shorter one. latter address will appear in The Advance next week as it has many points of interest warranting its reproduction in full. From the standpoint of the people of this riding the Friday address is by far the more imoprtant yet it has received little attention. The longer address on Thursday last was given more space in some of the newspapers than the more valuable one the following day. The reason for this was that the Thursday address suggested here in the expenditure of road money by the province during the past Dominion election. The reading of the letters submitted by Mr. Bradette do not substantiate this. To make out a case it is necessary to imply that no persons should recommend road expenditures to the Government, that no road money should be expended before a Dominion election, and that the Government should be held accountable for private correspondence. It would be just as much to the point to suggest that the new post office building was no more than a plan to bribe this town. Also, it may be hoped that no one will read out in the Legislature all the correspondence, private, as well as official. that may have been written before and after the post office was built, because an equally erroneous impression might be created. Mr. Bradette had these letters, or knew of these letters, at the time of the election campaign here some months ago, and he failed to use them here and then when they could have been dealt with in full. \$600 Said to be Overpaid

The case against Ludwig Johnson, who is alleged to have received \$600.00 more than he was legally entitled to from the Imperial Bank, was again before the police court here yesterday. The case was adjourned until this afternoon when argument will be made before the magistrate. G. H. Gauthier has been representing the bank, and A. C. Brown is appearing for the defendant. According to the facts as gleaned from the evidence, Johnson had dealings with the Imperial Bank at Winnipeg and through an error by one of the clerks \$600.00 too much was credited to Johnson's account. Later, the account was transferred to Timmins. and Johnson is alleged to have drawn out the \$600.00 that was not legally his. His attention was drawn to this by bank employees here but he did not return the money. The case accordingly was entered against him. At the court this week the clerk from Winnipeg gave evidence. He told how the mistake occurred. He had called Johnson's attention to the matter and pointed out that unless the bank was reimbursed he would personally have to make good the amount. He told the court that he could not well afford to do this, but that the rules of the bank would require this if Johnson did not return the money. To the police Johnson eventually admitted that he knew he had been credited with more money than was due him, but that after receiving the money here he had lost it while having a time, and so he did not have it now to return.

A salesman in town who was suspected by the police with selling more than the usual commercial supplies was found to be in illegal possession of liquor. For this he paid \$100.00 and costs at court this week.
