HOW THEY REGULATE THE STREET PARADES IN WEST

One method of stopping annoyance to loyal people by the communist type of parades has been adopted by the town council of the town of Drumheller, Alberta. The Drumheller Mail gives the following reference to the matter in its last issue:—

"No group shall hold a parade or procession within the city limits without a permit, says a by-law passed by council without discussion at the regular meeting of that body on Monday evening. The by-law provides that twenty-four hours notice shall be given to the chief of police before any such parade shall be held and that a British flag, or any flag recognized as such by the Dominion Government, of a size not less than three feet by six feet shall be carried against; the route itself should be guarded against; the route itself should be settled upon strictly on its own merits; without the least regard to being located near to any point where there now happens to be a number of unemployed. UNEMPLOYED WILL FLOCK WHEREVER THERE IS WORK

An editorial in The Northern Tribune, of Kapuskasing, last week says:— "Santa Claus always has his troubles when scattering his Yuletide munificence. His eclipse is threatened by Senator Robertson, who is being deluged with petitions for a share of the \$20,000,000 parliamentary grant just voted to relieve Canadian unemployment conditions. This large sum figures out to \$2 per capita for the Dominion, but the Minister of Labour's files must show requisitions for a hundred times that amount; and then some. The meritlessness of the requests certainly runs from about zero to 100 per cent. Not one of them rates higher in merit than the Northern-routed trans-Canada highway, for present aid to unemployed and future benefit to the whole country. But there is one thing to be guarded against; the route itself should be settled upon strictly on its own merits; without the least regard to being located near to any point where there now happens to be a number of unemployed. Many other works besides the national highway will be undertaken, with the aid of the federal grant, and effort should be made to take care, proportionately, of the unemployed from coast to coast in whatever ways seem best. Whatever labour is required in Northern Ontario for work on this section of the trans-Canada highway can be readily transported to the area of operations. In fact—to take Cochrane's present experience as an example—the faintest scent or trace of work seems to uncannily attract far more workers than can be absorbed."

PRODUCTION AT SHERRITT EXPECTED NEXT JANUARY

According to information from northern Manitoba, construction work at Sherritt-Gordon Mines is well up to schedule, and if the present rate is maintained the mill will be in production by the middle of January. It is now believed that the mill will be started on a basis of 1,200 tons daily, unless there is a distinct improvement in the zinc market within the next few months.

The crushing plant is in and foundations for the mill building have been laid. Steel is arriving at the property and construction work will be rushed. The underground crusher at the main shaft has been completed.

Mining operations are proceeding and additional ore is being blocked out by the underground crew. Work is also under way to dewater the east shaft and preliminary work on the aerial tramway will be started within a month.

According to present plans, the management will not take ore from the east shaft unless there is some distinct improvement in the zinc situation. The company plans to hold zinc production to a minimum, and in order to accomplish this will draw mill feed almost entirely from the west and main shafts.
