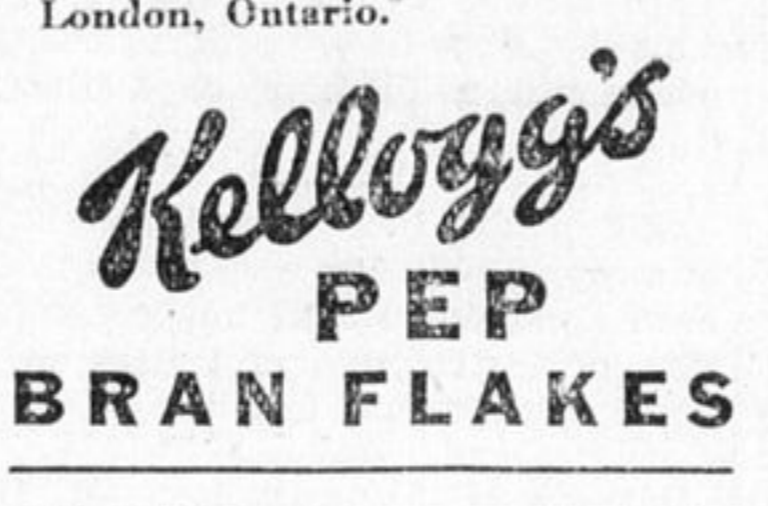

Carnation Tuna Fish Entree with Cucumber Sauce—1 tsp. gelatine, 3 tbsps. cold water, 1/2 cup stiff Carnation No-Egg Mayonnaise, 2 cups tuna fish (white preferred), 2 tbsps. lemon juice, 1/2 cup chopped celery, 2 tbsps. chopped pimiento, 1/2 cup chopped sweet pickles, 1 tsp. salt, few grains pepper. Soak gelatine in cold water 5 minutes; dissolve over hot water. Beat dissolved gelatine into mayonnaise. Pour lemon juice over flaked fish; add remaining ingredients, folding in mayonnaise last. Mold and chill. Serve on lettuce with
