OTTAWA DOCTOR FLIES TO ASSISTANCE OF INDIANS

On another errand of mercy, Dr. J. Wall, well-known Ottawa physician who has seen considerable experience in the field, was rushed from Ottawa by airplane on Saturday into the Indian settlements of interior Quebec to bring succor to hundreds of natives reported to be suffering from a serious flu epidemic.

Government reports on which Dr. Wall was despatched to the rescue, declared two Indians have already died, four others are in an extremely critical condition, and tribes over a wide area of the North Land have been stricken by the epidemic.

Arrangements for the "mercy flight" were completed on Friday evening, and the expedition placed in charge of Flight-Lieutenant J. E. Jellison, Royal Canadian Air Force, who took Sergeant Green, R.C.A.F., as his assistant and mechanic in the Bellanca machine assigned to the work.

All was in readiness for the long hop on Saturday morning, and at 9 o'clock that day the seaplane took off from the Ottawa river opposite the Government airport at Rockcliffe, with the Lake St. John district as its immediate destination.

In addition to the regular emergency kit carried on such expeditions, the flight took supplies for the Indians and a large store of medical equipment including a quantity of vaccine.

The report which prompted the Government to send help into this area came from an official of the Hudson Bay Company who returned to Montreal late last week after a trip into the interior of the Lake St. John district. This officer telegraphed the Department of Indian Affairs that there were four sick in one tent at one Indian settlement he visited, and cases were widespread.

The return of the flying party to Ottawa is looked for late this week.

NEW RADIO RECEIVER FOR INSTALLING IN MOTOR CARS

Will Not Mutilate Car, Avoids Disturbing Upholstery or Top. New and Improved Radio Receiver by Bosch Magneto Corporation.

The new motor car radio receiver recently announced by the American Bosch Magneto Corporation, builders of precision automotive electrical instruments for a long period of years, is unique in that it can be quickly installed on any motor car without the least mutilation or damage to the car to lower its resale value at some future date.

A special capacitor plate which is suspended to the frame of the car parallel to the running board face to the ground, eliminates the need for a roof antenna and provides greater sensitivity.

The radio chassis is mounted in a rubber cushioned bracket to the rear side of partition, which separates the engine compartment from the car body.

The simple control unit, no larger than a man's hand, attaches to the right side of the instrument panel, and is connected to the chassis by a rigid steel shaft.

The receiver utilizes five tubes, four of which are type 224 screen grid tubes and the fifth a type 112A power tube.

A cone type electromagnetic speaker, highly sensitive to low notes as well as the high notes and of particularly pleasing tone quality, can be mounted directly to the receiver chassis or to the ceiling of the car on brackets supplied for that purpose.

The receiver operates from the storage battery of the car and from dry cell "B" batteries carried in a weather-proof steel container mounted underneath the car.

Bosch Motor Car Radio comes complete with receiver, speaker, tubes, "B" batteries and container, and wiring materials.
