Mr. Sammon in the meantime has been visiting various parts of the country, but says now that he has found no town he likes better than Timmins. He is an experienced hotel manager with long years of success to his credit, the hotel he conducted at Pembroke for instance, being known far and wide. At Timmins and North Bay he was also successful and popular and he will be welcomed back to the management of the Empire hotel, Timmins. Mr. Sammon will take over the management of the Empire hotel here next week.

Mr. Denison had not been ill and the death accordingly comes as a shock to all who knew him. No particulars are to hand in regard to the death.

STUDYING RELATIONS OF MINES AND MUNICIPALITIES

Commissioner Appointed by Government on Tour of North. Railway and Municipal Board Also Pays Visit to Timmins.

J. A. Ellis, director of the Bureau of Municipal Affairs, is in town this week in connection with his work under his recent appointment by the Ontario Government as a commissioner to study the relations in so far as assessment and taxes are concerned between the mines and the organized municipalities of the North. It has been contended by the municipalities that they are discriminated against in regard to taxes received from mining properties, the exemptions in regard to mining properties leaving the municipalities in a much less favourable position than they would be in reference to any other type of industry. The present exemptions to the mines in the matter of mining assessments are designed to assist the industry which is recognized as a hazardous one. The municipalities hold, however, that their position is deserving alone of consideration, the growth of the municipalities for sanitation, fire protection, schools, and other services being in direct proportion to the growth of the mines, but the returns in taxes not keeping pace under present conditions and regulations. The commissioner was appointed to look into the whole question and report to the government. He has visited Cobalt, Kirkland Lake and other mining centres and this week is securing data in Timmins and the Porcupine.

At the same time as the visit of the commissioner, Timmins has been having a visit from the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board in reference to matters of assessment and taxation between the mines and the municipalities. Chairman McEwan, vice-chairman Ingram and Mr. Ellis, member of the Railway and Municipal Board held a session in the Oddfellows hall to-day to consider the appeal in the case of the Township of Tisdale and the Hollinger Gold Mines in regard to the assessment and taxes on the "sand claims" in the township. The Hollinger and the township do not agree as to the rate at which these claims should be assessed and because of the principles of law concerned the town of Timmins is interested in the decision of the case. G. H. Gauthier presented the case for the township, while J. E. Holden, solicitor for the Hollinger, was present for the company. The board heard both sides of the case and will study the presentation of the matter from both sides and give their decision at as early a date as possible.

Another matter being considered this week in reference to the visit of the commissioner and the Railway and Municipal Board is the matter of the municipalities' share of the gold royalty.

While in town the Railway and Municipal Board also had under consideration the matter of the annexation by Timmins of the Gauthier and Bartleman townships. This was formally passed some time ago and the Board granted an order in confirmation of the annexation. Through some misunderstanding the order, as finally drafted, was not what the Board and the Town had considered as agreed upon, and so the question was re-opened until the proper order could be passed by the Board. The Board studied this matter this week and as soon as all the facts in the case are at hand and the subject considered in all its bearings the order will be formally passed.

INFANTILE PARALYSIS CASE REPORTED IN THE NORTH

A death from infantile paralysis was reported from the Englehart district last week, a fifteen-year-old girl being the victim of the disease. The youngster was Catharine Fraser, elder daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Fraser, of Dame, who died of infantile paralysis on Saturday morning. The child had been ill only a few days and previously had enjoyed good health.

BOOST ALBERTA COAL NOW RATHER THAN THE RUSSIAN

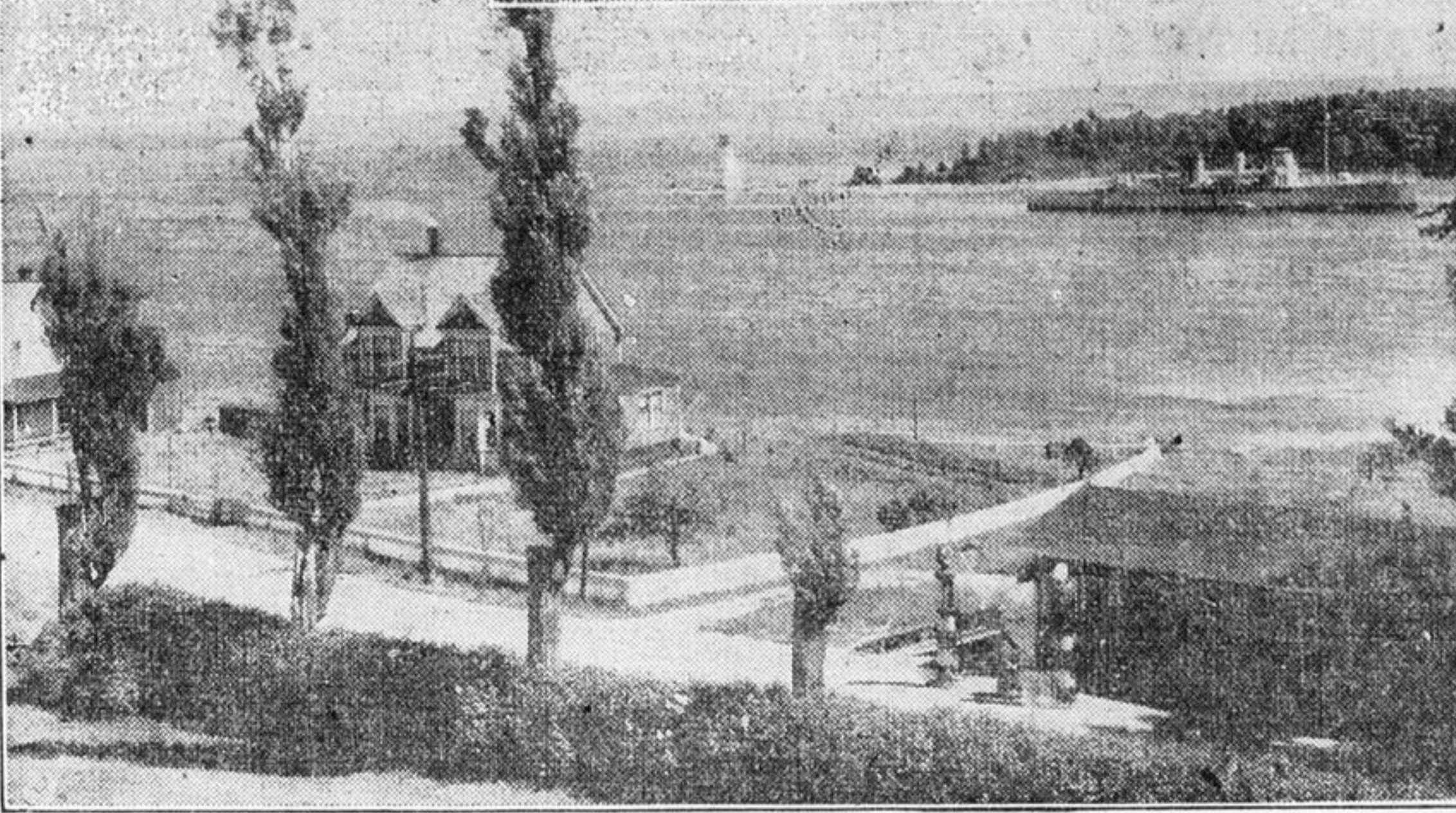
Actual experience has proven that December 1 is too late in the year for the inauguration of the trial rate of \$6.75 per ton on shipments of Alberta coal to Ontario. What is needed is the continuance of the special low rate throughout the entire year to permit of the building up of huge reserves in the eastern province. Consumption of Alberta coal in the east would serve two excellent purposes. It would give the eastern consumers cheaper fuel and release them from absolute dependence on foreign supply, and it would create a great deal of extra employment in this province.


