Two of the Brokers Plead Guilty to the One Charge

James Heppleston and W. T. H. Shutt of the A. E. Moysey Co., pleaded guilty at Toronto this week to one of the three charges on which they were indicted and were remanded in custody for sentence by Mr. Justice Jeffrey at the fall assizes on Monday. J. W. Wray, facing similar charges, was released on a renewal of bail pending the Crown's decision regarding proceedings against him.

T. N. Phelan, K.C. counsel for the accused first made a motion to have the trial postponed to a later date, contending that it would be impossible to obtain a fair trial with public opinion in its present state. He referred to several excerpts from the Toronto press as being reflections of the public mind, particularly on the imposing of fines alone in the case of Solloway and Mills.

His Lordship refused the motion to postpone the hearing, following which Mr. Phelan, acting with J. Earl Lawson for Heppleston and Shutt, entered a plea of guilty to the count of conspiring to defraud the public.

W. N. Tilley, K.C., special Crown prosecutor, stated that he would require time to consider continuing with the two remaining counts, conspiring to affect the price of stocks and gaming in stocks, and would also have to consider what course to adopt regarding Wray.

He added that he thought it improper that such articles as Mr. Phelan had referred to should appear in the press when Solloway and Mills were awaiting a hearing before the Supreme Court of Alberta, on an appeal and cross-appeal against their conviction there.

The last group of brokers, those convicted with Stobie Furlong & Co., went on trial on Tuesday. After this case is completed the cases of Messrs Heppleston, Shutt and Wray will again come up for consideration.

In an eloquent plea for his clients, Mr. Phelan said they had only carried on a system they found when they started with the firm. He said it was a complicated system of finance quite above the grasp of the average jury. He said the Crown could show that the firm had been short over \$7,000,000 in stock, but would not equally emphasize the fact that clients owed the firm at the same time over \$8,000,000. At that time they had a surplus of two million dollars. No one had lost money through the firm, except due to the ordinary losses through market trading.

J. Earl Lawson, M.P., has been given power of attorney by Messrs Shutt and Heppleston to carry on the business in the meantime.
