# POLLUTION OF STREAMS

In order to prevent injury being done to fish life through the dumping of sawdust and other mill refuse into waters frequented by fish, energetic steps Room 15-K.P.-Miss McIntosh, tea- are being taken by the Dominion Department of Fisheries to enforce strictly the law against such pollution where the fisheries are under Dominion administration. Imperative instructions have been given that pollution be stopped and that proceedings be taken against any offending mill operators.

Sawdust may be injurious to fish life in several ways, as, for instance, in covering spawning beds. "Probably the most important effect of all," it has been pointed out by Dr. A. G. Huntsman, Senior Director of the Biological Board of Canada, "is the decomposition of the sawdust where it accumulates on the bottom in the quieter regions of the streams and rivers. This decomposition uses up the oxygen, which is so important for the fish, and the amount in the water may be reduced to such small proportions as to kill fry. There would be the probability of this result wherever sawdust accumulated in large

#### Gold Strike Reported Now From Senneterre Lilia McKay.

A despatch last week from Haileybury says:-"What is considered an important gold find is reported from Carscallen township, in the Quebec mining area, by Phil St. Louis, Haileybury prospector, who is just out from that section. About 100 claims have been staked in the district since news of the find got abroad.'

#### HAILEYBURY NOW ASKING FOR AN AIR PORT THERE

The Haileyburian last week says:-"An attempt is being made to interest the Department of Public Works a Ottawa in the improvement of th Haileybury harbour as an air port and a delegation will shortly visit Ottawa to interview the ministers and endeavour to have an early start to provide employment during the winter month A meeting of the town council and the council of the board of trade was held on Tuesday afternoon, when the pro ject was discussed and the action de cided on.

"Several years ago Haileybury was designated as an air port by the department concerned and since that time it has been included as such on all maps issued for the purpose of aerial travel. There have been no improvements made, however, to make it a mor suitable harbour for aircraft and it was felt that this was an opportune time to have some work done towards this end. The erection of a breakwater, it is generally understood, is the chief necessity in order that planes may be brought to a safe anchorage in stormy weather. It was pointed out at the meeting on Tuesday that there had been times during this summer when it was impossible to make a safe landing on account of the wind and that fliers had been forced to seek some other landing place, when they desired to call here. A large number of planes had called during the navigation season, but it was certain that many more would make Haileybury a regular stopping place if better facilities were pro-
