

MUCH ROUTINE BUSINESS AT BRIEF COUNCIL MEET

Regular Meeting of Council on Tuesday Had Short Session, but Dealt With Many Questions of Interest.

The regular meeting of the town council was held on Tuesday afternoon, the regular meeting day, Monday of this week, being a Dominion holiday.

One of the matters that came before the council in incidental way in connection with the payment of accounts was the fact that the new town nurse, Miss Brooks, recently of Montreal, took over her duties here some days ago.

Council authorized some rebates of water rates in cases where parties had moved during the quarter and the water had not been used.

Routine accounts, payrolls, etc., were ordered paid. Water frontage charged in error was authorized to be written off.

The payment of \$150.00 to G. W. Parsons for two lots from which the town could secure good gravel, was authorized.

Payments on account to the public and separate schools were passed. An income tax assessment was written off in a case where the man assessed was not liable for such assessment.

A street light was ordered to be installed on Cameron street under the direction of the town engineer, J. D. MacLean.

Authority was given for the return of \$70.00 to Chas. Pierce for a lot purchased in error at the recent tax sale.

The matter of the charges for use of water on construction work this year was again before council and eventually a resolution was passed that the construction water rate charges in the case of church properties be reduced to a monthly rate of \$5.00 and that rebate in accordance with such rate be granted in the case of 112 Spruce street, being the property of the Church of the Nativity.

TRANSIENTS MAY BE USED FOR SPLITTING OF WOOD The suggestion has been made that the town keep a supply of cordwood on the town lot behind the municipal building, this wood to be used as a sort of test for applicants for beds and meals.

A report current here last week that the local communists intended to hold a parade on Sunday turned out to be incorrect. Protest Against Reduction of Wages on Roadwork Here

General Dissatisfaction With the Cutting of Pay From \$3.00 to \$2.40 per Day on Relief Work on the Roads. Hon. Mr. Finlayson Lays Blame on 8-hour day Regulation. A. F. Kenning, M.P., and Other Northern Members Press Government to Adjust Matters in Interests of People.

There has been a storm of protest this week over the fact that men who have been working on the road work in the North organized as a relief measure for unemployment find they are to receive only \$2.40 per day, instead of the \$3.00 per day expected.

As soon as the matter of the reduction in pay was brought to the attention of A. F. Kenning, M.P. for this riding,—and he was instantly besieged with complaints about what the men could not consider otherwise than a cut in pay, because they were getting only \$2.40 per day where they had previously received \$3.00—he hastened to present the case to the Ontario Government and to urge a fair deal for the settlers and others. Mr. Kenning is being joined by other members of the Ontario House in pressing the matter to the attention of the Government.
