INSURANCE RATES CUT AT KIRKLAND LAKE LAST WEEK

insurance rates on property in Kirkland Lake was announced last week the reduced rates to be effective from Dec. 15th. The rate on frame buildings has been reduced to \$4.95 per hundred from \$5.50. On brick mercantile buildings the new rate will be \$3.60, whereas it has been \$4.00. On nonmercantile buildings in the business section the new rate is \$2.63. The rate on brick dewellings was \$1.30, but it is now \$1.17. The average rate now on frame dewellings will be \$2.03, which is a reduction of about ten per cent There are some frame dwellings that will have a rate as low as \$1.62.

#### Where Santa Claus Gets His Toys for Christmas

(From National Revenue Review) With Santa Claus on his sleigh with eight reindeer, Dancer, Prancer, Donner, Blitzen and the others, already on their way from the North Pole, it may be of interest to know where the jolly old chap gets the toys with which he fills the stockings of Canadian boys and girls on Christmas Eve.

Toy-making in Canada is a growing industry, but a considerable proportion of toys is imported from other counnoted before in The Advance it is the tries. Figures compiled by the Statistical Branch of the Department of National Revenue show that the total toy imports, including dolls, for the year ended March 31, 1930, amounted to \$2. 691,408. Of this total, imports from the United States were \$1,077,504; Germany, \$971,665; the United Kingdom, It will be noted that all games in the \$331,142; Japan, \$201,046; Czecho-Slovakia, \$42,137; France, \$40,126. In the same fiscal year Canadian exports of toys, including dolls, etc., were valued at \$32,262; an increase over the previous year of over five thousand dollars The principal buyers of Canadian-made toys are the United States, New Zealand and Newfoundland.

### **GOLD STANDARD THE BEST** METHOD FOR STABILITY

Another Angle on the Subject Discovered by Miss Agnes MacPhail, M.P.,-Gold Standard or Managed Currency to be the Plan.

The question of the maintenance of the gold standard or the adoption of a 71 managed currency is being widely discussed at the present time. Reference is made elsewhere to the ideas or otherwise of Miss Agnes MacPhail, M.P., on the question. The matter is of very great importance to the North Land as the discarding of the gold standard would have a serious effect on the gold mining industry. Great Britain holds a large proportion of the known sources of gold supply for the world and it is jointed dolls, which moved at the tug difficult to see how the Empire could consider the discontinuance of the gold standard without the most serious loss and damage. General conditions have been adversely affected in Canada by the low prices for wheat and farm products, but when it is considered that world production of wheat has increased under conditions of lessened consumption, it seems unwarranted to attribute the result to the power of gold. It might be contended with more reason that the decreased buying power of the shortage and restricted circulation of gold, which in turn reacted on prices of commodities which continued to be demand. Keynes has stated that "after the discovery of gold in Australia and California, gold began to depreciate dangerously, and before the exploitation of South Africa it began to appreciate dangerously. In 1929, by arrangement, there was practical embargo on gold movement in this country. The federal reserve was permitted to get down to \$61,647,000 on June 30, 1929. But by September 30, 1930, it had risen to over \$95,000,000. Yet it is plain that this larger supply of gold did not prove equal to holding Fuke and Wylie won from Urquhart prices up, for the reason that supply and demand outside Canada had effect on prices in this country. But it was an agreeable fact that for the past four Fuke and Wylie won from Gustafson months the Canadian dollar was at a premium in New York, while exports fell below the 1929 record. In this connection it is to the point to recall what Reginald McKenna's comment said: "It must be remembered that whether we are on a gold or any other standard the direction in which the price level moves is immediately determined by the volume of money as modified by its rate of turnover in relation to the volume of business." It is an accepted feature of American banking policy in Federal Reserve activities that the bank rate has a direct effect on price levels. In line with that theory the U.S. Federal Reserve Board moved the bank rate up or down, as seemed to be demanded by economic conditions, and particularly the gyrations of the stock markets, in 1928 and 1929. It would appear there is need at present for vigilance to help restore the market, not only of securities, but also of basic commodi-
