

Convention of Liberals From All Over Province of Ontario Elects Hepburn as Leader. Planks in the New Liberal Platform.

At the provincial Liberal convention held at Toronto last week the party elected a new leader and adopted a new plank. The new leader is Mr. Hepburn, M.P., and the new platform may be summarized as follows:-
