FLAGS HERE HALF-MAST IN RESPECT FOR GEN. JOFFRE

The flags in town are flying half-mast this week in respect for Marshal Joffre, last of the French military leaders of the great war, who died on Saturday after a fortnight's illness. He was two days less than 79 years old. During his last illness it was necessary to amputate one of his legs. After a gallant battle against the illness that had overtaken him, Gen. Joffre lapsed into a state of coma from which he never survived, King George V in his message of sympathy voiced the feelings of the British people in the death of Marshal Joffre, the message in part saying:—"I join with my people in expressing heartfelt sympathy in the death of Marshal Joffre. The sad news will arouse feelings of sorrow especially in those countries which in 1914 were allied to France. We shall mourn the close of the life of him who in those momentous days was called to the supreme command of the great French Army with which for four long years the forces of the British Army were comrades in arms. I treasure the memory of my meetings with Marshal Joffre on the occasions of my several visits to the front. Please convey to Madame Joffre and the Marshal's relatives my most heartfelt sympathy. Marshal Joffre, known affectionately to the French soldiers as Papa Joffre will be chiefly remembered as the hero of the Marne, his brave patience and skill being credited with the final throwing back of the German army from entry into Paris itself in the early days of the war.

Perth Courier—An increased grant to the Women's Institutes of Ontario is promised by the Hon. T. L. Kennedy, the new Minister of Agriculture. The news will be well received not only throughout the membership of the various branches of this organization which have been established in different rural centres but, as well, on the part of those who appreciate what the Institutes are doing to improve rural life. If the Provincial Government is to make a larger grant for the maintenance of these organizations, very few people knowing anything about the work that they carry on will begrudge it to them.

High-Grade Samples from Week's Run of the Press

While there is a marked improvement on the part of potato growers in the grading and marking of their product for sale the general practice is still far short of the requirements of federal regulations under the Root Vegetables Act. The Dominion Fruit Commissioner states that in Ontario alone over fifty infractions have been dealt with by his inspection staff so far this year. The general requirements for marketing potatoes are:—They must be graded "Canada No. 1" "Canada No. 2" "Canada No. 3" or "Canada Fancy"; the grade must be marked by a tag on bags and by stenciling on barrels or other containers, the marking to show the name and address of the grower and the grade of potatoes in the package. The regulations for grading and marking potatoes apply

throughout Canada and infractions involve serious penalties.
