Death of Maxine Morin at Montreal Last Week

Friends in Timmins and district will learn with deep regret of the death at Montreal on Wednesday of last week, Jan. 17th, of Maxine Morin, who for the previous twelve years had been a resident of Timmins. Death was due to acute indigestion. The late Maxine Morin made many friends in Timmins during the dozen years he resided here, and his death will be much regretted, and very sincere sympathy will be extended to the bereaved widow and family.

Mr. Morin, who resided on Fifth avenue, opposite St. Mary's hospital, Timmins, left here in November for a visit to Montreal where his family were living. He was expected back to work here after the new year but was taken ill and passed away on Wednesday morning last at an early hour. The funeral was held on Friday of last week, Jan. 9th. Requiem high mass was said in Notre Dame de Sept Douleurs, Verdun. Interment was made at Cotes des Neiges cemetery.

Among the near relatives surviving are a widow and seven children residing in Montreal. The oldest girl, Miss Lorette Morin, is 17 years, and the youngest child only three years of age.
