### FORMAL OPENING KIWANIS WARDS AT HOSPITAL HERE

Delightful Evening Spent by Kiwanis Members, Their Ladies, and Guests, at Anniversary of Charter Night of the Club.

Monday of this week was the anniversary of the Charter Night of the Timmins Kiwanis Club, and so was an evening meeting and it was also a ladies' night. The event proved most interesting and enjoyable. At 6.30 p.m. the Kiwanis members, their ladies and guests met at the St. Mary's hospital to inspect the wards furnished there by the Kiwanis. There were about sixty present, approximately half being ladies. Rev. Fr. Theriault and Sister Fidelis showed the visitors various features of interest in regard to the unusually well-equipped and well-appointed hospital. In the unavoidable absence of Dr. H. H. Moore, Rev. Fr. Theriault directed the visitors to the Kiwanis wards. There are three of these wards, all for the use of children. Each of the wards has two beds, and they are beautifully furnished and equipped. The wards were furnished by the Kiwanis Club as part of its 1930 programme, while the purchase of goods necessary and their arrangement and the other details were in the very capable hands of a committee of the ladies of the Kiwanees. The result is a most pleasing one. The furnishing of each ward is carried through on a distinctive colour scheme, artistic and attractive, and the good work of the ladies is going to make all patients in these wards happier in their illness. The curtains in each room are specially pleasing, while the furnishings are complete to the final word, including even food trays, with dishes to match the rooms and silverware, etc.

After the formal opening of the wards at the hospital, the gathering adjourned to the Empire hotel for dinner at seven o'clock.

President J. R. Walker was in the chair and gave hearty welcome to the guests of the evening. After the dinner had been enjoyed, there was an attractive programme of music and brief addresses. A. W. Lang led the community singing, which was an appreciated feature of the evening. The "Porcupine Song" and "Round the Corner" were among the favourites as usual.

C. G. Keddle in a brief but comprehensive little address proposed the toast to the visitors, giving them hearty welcome on behalf of the club. G. A. Macdonald being called up to reply to this toast.

A feature of the evening that was greatly appreciated by all was the singing of the "Trelawney Male Quartette," including Messrs Jago, Deeking, Bawden and Thomas. This fine quartette, with its pleasing blending of good voices, delighted the gathering. The selections by this quartette during the evening included:—"Kentucky Babe," "Little Johnny Went a-Fishing" and "Dreamland," and each number was a gem.

Another very pleasing feature was the banjo playing by L. Taylor, who gave in very effective way, "Song Without a Name" and "A Vagabond Lover," being enthusiastically applauded. W. H. Wilson played the piano accompaniment.

The tenor solo, "My Task," by Mr. Jago was given in fine voice and pleasing expression and won general favour. An outstanding feature of the evening was the violin playing by Mitchell Rice, who won unstinted applause on merit. His first number was:—"Interlude and Tarantelle," and as an encore he gave the "Int. rmezzo from Cavaleria Rusticana." Both these numbers were given with rare talent and effectiveness. Mr. A. Sprague played the piano accompaniment.

In the absence of Dr. H. H. Moore, Rev. Fr. Theriault was asked to say a few words on behalf of the hospital and responded in his usual witty and pleasing way. On behalf of the St. Mary's hospital, the Sister Superior and the staff there he thanked the Kiwanis for their kindness and interest in furnishing the wards for the children. He also touched on the history of the hospital and the gallant struggle made by the Sisters to found the hospital and carry it on in the extended way necessary. It looked after everybody, irrespective of creed or other divisions and was carrying on a necessary and valuable work in able way.

President J. R. Walker expressed the pleasure felt by having the ladies present and agreed with a previous speaker that they should be present more frequently. He cordially thanked the artists of the evening and the others contributing to the programme. The Kiwanis Club was always pleased to welcome guests.

The pleasant gathering closed with the singing of "O, Canada."

A specially amusing feature of the evening was the introduction of those present by themselves, many of the introductions being unusually witty and amusing.

Reports were current in Timmins last week that Rev. J. D. Parks, now of North Bay, but for some eleven years minister in charge of the United Church at Timmins, was likely to accept a call to a church in the South. One report here was that the call was to Barrie, but as a matter of fact it is to Grace United Church, Brampton, Ont. Friends in town of Rev. Mr. Parks and Mrs. Parks will be interested in the matter and regretful, indeed, at the loss to the North by their removal. Last Saturday The North Bay Nugget published a half-tone photo of Rev. Mr. Parks, and also the following reference to his expected departure in June of this year:

"Rev. J. D. Parks, B.A., B.D., minister of St. Andrew's United Church, has received a call from Grace United Church, Brampton, and the announcement was made to the Board of Managers and the session on Tuesday evening. There was general regret expressed by those present at the prospect of losing the services of Mr. Parks but the call was passed on to the congregation and will probably be dealt with at the annual meeting of the congregation which is to be held on Wednesday next. If the congregation gives its consent, and there is every reason to believe that it will not object, Rev. Mr. Parks will leave here at the end of the conference year in June.

"Rev. Mr. Parks has been in North Bay two years, next June, succeeding the Rev. J. M. Pritchard. He was formerly minister of the United Church in Timmins where he was most successful. Since his coming to North Bay the congregation of St. Andrew's church has increased until it has reached the limit of the accommodation of the edifice. Mr. Parks is a forceful speaker, is very earnest in his work and possesses a great deal of personal magnetism. He has taken an active part in the relief work of this city and spends a great deal of his time in this endeavour. He is chairman of the associated charities of North Bay.

"A graduate of Toronto University, Rev. Mr. Parks has been a keen student, a fluent speaker and an active Christian worker. He will be greatly missed both in the congregation of St. Andrew's and in the city as a whole. He has earned the respect and esteem of everyone with whom he has been associated and his place in the community will be hard to fill."

A social and dance will be held in the Moose hall, Fourth avenue, on Friday evening of this week, Jan. 23rd, under the auspices of the Moose Entertainment committee. Among the special features will be the Trelawney Quartette and several other of Timmins' best talent. There will be good music and refreshments.
