FUNERAL LAST WEEK OF OLD RESIDENT OF COBALT CAMP

The funeral took place on Friday last at Cobalt of one of the pioneer residents of that camp in the person of Adolph Lavegne, who had been a resident of the Cobalt camp for but a year less than a quarter century. In this young country of the North twenty-four years is a long period of residence and worthy of passing note on this account. A despatch last week from Cobalt refers to the death of the late Mr. Lavegne as follows:—"The funeral took place at Cobalt on Friday, Jan. 16th, from his late residence on Lang street, of Adolph Lavegne, for 24 years a resident of the Cobalt camp, who died in Halleybury hospital from complications which developed from an operation performed there on December 6 last. Requiem mass was celebrated in Ste. Therese's Roman Catholic Church by Rev. Father Chapleau, the parish priest, and burial was made in the cemetery at Mileage 104. Mr. Lavegne was a native of St. Eugene and was 65 years of age. In his younger days he spent 18 years in the United States, chiefly in Duluth and Minneapolis, following his occupation of carpenter. Later he returned to Canada, settling in Papineauville, from which place he came to Cobalt in November, 1906, during his residence here he was at different times millwright at the Dominion Reduction, King Edward and Trethewey properties, and of late years had been engaged chiefly in construction work. Surviving are his widow, four sisters, Mrs. D. Longpre, of Papineauville, and Mrs. V. Martel and the Misses Alma and Mary Lavegne, all of Montreal, also are left. Relatives from out of town who attended the funeral were Mrs. J. Duval, Buckingham; Mrs. J. Robitaille, Detroit, and Z. Fournier, of Schumacher.

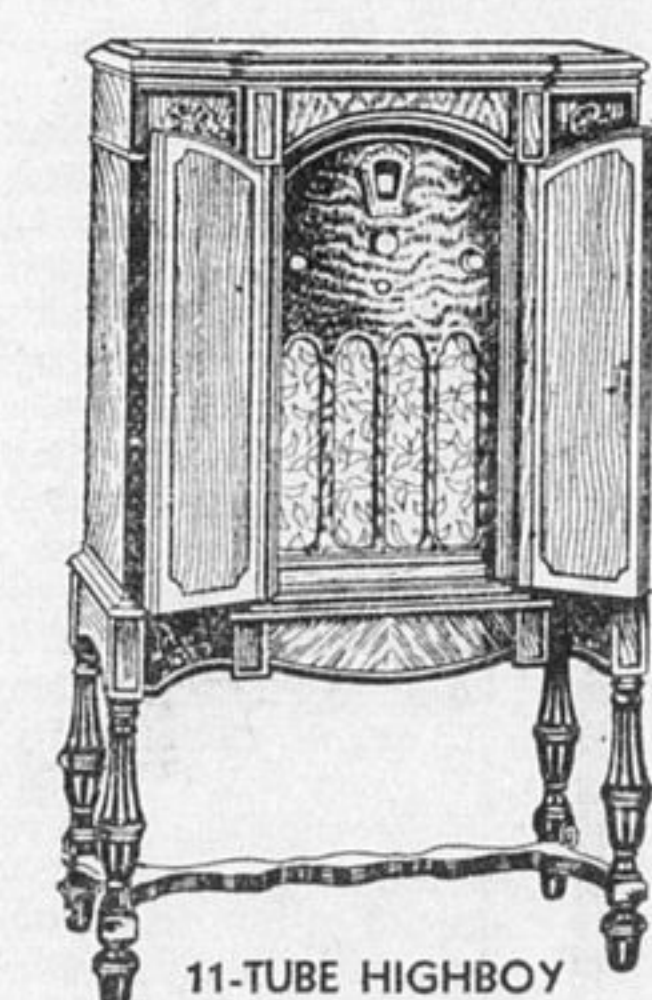

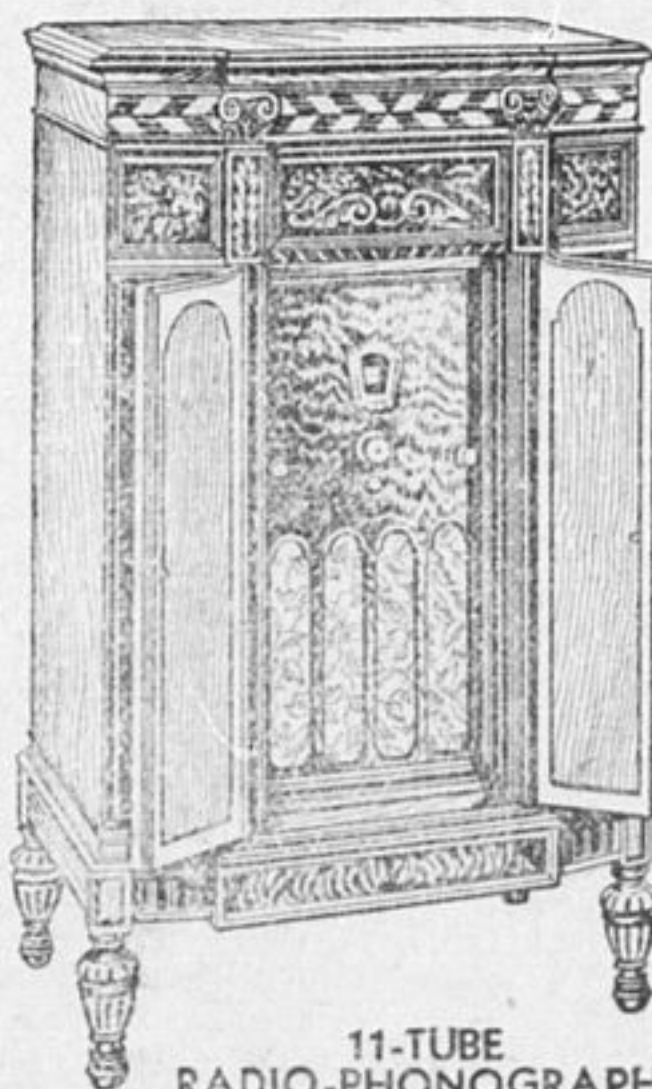

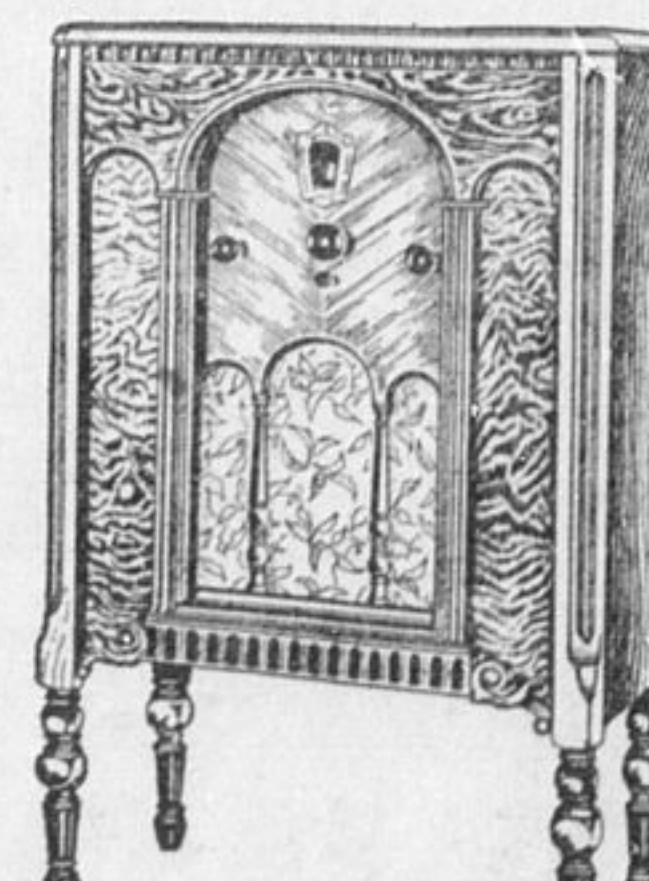
