SO. PORCUPINE OLD-TIMER DROPS DEAD ON THE ROAD

Frank Kallio Expires from Heart Trouble. Carnival at Rink Largely Attended. Other News from South Porcupine Correspondent.

South Porcupine, January 20th, 1931. Special to The Advance.

Miss Marita Arbour, of Toronto, is holidaying with her sisters in camp. Mr. H. P. DePencier, managing director of the Dome Mines, left on Sunday for the South.

Little Isabel Hepburn, the six-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. Hepburn, is seriously ill and likely to be confined to her bed for some months with rheumatic fever.

The carnival put on by the Rink Committee on Wednesday, January 14th, was largely attended but there were very few in costume owing to the severity of the weather. The skating was good as there was a splendid sheet of ice. As there was so little competition only three prizes were given. As a green and gold pierrot Miss Ivy Freeman got the first for lady's fancy costume. Margaret Lloyd as a coloured mammy took the prize for lady's comic. She was accompanied by Stella MacDougall dressed as the coloured daddy, and between them they toted a much-fussed-up pickaninny. "Chick" Abramson, as the South End Garage had the most outstanding costume on the ice. Draped with auto accessories of various types with an inflated inner tube as a necklace he made a comical picture, and obtained the man's prize given. Other costumes were:—Reg Vaughan, clown; H. Chevrier and Vladimir Capyk, ducky minstrels. There were no races or children's costume prizes. The Rink Committee purposes putting on a carnival especially for children later on. It is to be hoped it won't be quite such severe cold so that the kiddies can come in all their gala array without danger of taking cold.

Mr. P. Childs has taken over the management of the skating arena and is giving very careful attention to the ice and keeping the dressing-rooms in good shape. Over two hundred children from the Dome and town took advantage of the free skating on Saturday afternoon last. From tots just able to toddle around on their bob skates to the High School boy who thinks he knows it all where skating or sport is concerned, they had a merry time. There was another record attendance on Saturday night in spite of the fact that the mild weather had made it impossible to flood the rink for a new sheet of ice. Skating lasts until eleven on Saturday nights and it is much appreciated by the committee how many citizens both of the Dome and town that are availing themselves of this healthy pastime. Dressing rooms formerly ample in their accommodation are becoming inadequate for the number attending.

On Thursday evening last the South Porcupine High School Club played Timmins High School in their first N. O.H.A. hockey fixture on home ice, the home team being on the happy side of a 4-2 score. The Timmins squad were represented by Ray Wallingford, Christian Charron, Sheridan, Shields, Walter Finkelman, Grant Barron, Don McLaughlan, Fred Grant, Francis Gilbert, and Mike Lucan. South Porcupine lined-up—goal, Ken Myers; defence, Ross McPhail and Harry McLean; centre, Carlo Cattarello; wings, Paul Mercier and Douglas McCann. "Bun" Doran, Homer McIntosh and Owen Wright were the reserves. Zigmund Ostrowsky acted as referee. Carlo and Doug were the scorers for South Porcupine while Charron and Shields put the rubber across for Timmins. Ken Myers did some good work in goal for the home youngsters as the visiting team were decidedly the heavier and more aggressive. "Bun" Doran the midget of the Porcupines, won decided applause on various occasions by his nifty stick-handling. Doug McCann is an energetic player and was a threat to Timmins whenever he was on the ice. Paul Mercier was watched closely when he sailed up the ice with his long lanky stride and has a reach when he goes after the puck that tickled the fans. Cattarello was particularly good at centre, passing unreservedly to his wing men. The two defence men gave their goalie good protection and when his rear-guard let down Ken was on the alert to keep his citadel safe. South Porcupine scored in the first period. They came back to do it again in the second, Timmins also tallying in this frame. Fairly fast play for a school fixture featured this period. In the third period Timmins got in another while the home team tobogganed up to four. Doug McCann did some pretty work in checking. Bun Doran with Harry McLean and again with Cattarello made some smart two-man rushes, their passing and stick-handling being a treat. Quite a large number of supporters were out for the game.

The curling club have added quite a number of new members to their number this year. Others wishing to join will also be welcomed.

On Sunday evening last the annual vestry meeting of St. Paul's Anglican Church was held after the service. The officials elected for the ensuing year were:—vicar's warden, W. MINING CLAIM HOLDERS

DEPARTMENT OF MINES
NOTICE

To Holders of Mining Claims in Ontario Not Yet Patented or Leased.

Notice is hereby given to holders of mining claims, wheresoever situated, upon which the work specified in the Mining Act has been prohibited or restricted to a stated period by the Minister of Lands and Forests under the authority of the Mining Act, or where permission to do the work has been given under conditions and limitations designed to protect the timber, THAT under the Forest Fires Prevention Act, 1930, they are required to apply to the District Forester in the District in which the land is situated for a permit to perform such work, and that failure to apply for such permit, or upon issue of the same, failure to perform and record the work prescribed by the Mining Act, will subject their claim to cancellation. The time for performing and recording the said work is extended by Order-in-Council to and including the 15th day of November, 1931. If the work is so done and recorded, the time for computing the date before which further work upon the claim is required, will be computed as from the said 15th day of November, 1931.

The name and address of the District Forester to whom application for such permit should be made, may be obtained from the Recorder of the Mining Division in which the claim is situated. A miner's license in the name of the applicant, or due renewal of the same, must accompany the application and the number or numbers of the mining claim or claims must be clearly stated.
