V. Mondeaux Dies From Fall at McIntyre Mine

Sincere sympathy will be extended to the widow and family in the death on Thursday last of Valmir Mondeaux following a fall from a scaffold while at work at the McIntyre Mine. He was putting asbestos insulation on some pipes and it is thought that in using a pipe wrench he overbalanced himself and fell to the rock below, a distance of some fourteen feet. He fractured his skull and suffered other injuries. He was hurried to the hospital where he passed away, despite all that skill and attention could do. The funeral took place on Monday morning to the St. Anthony's church, and was largely attended. The late Mr. Mondeaux had been a resident of Timmins for some nine years past and was well known and popular. He leaves seven children, the oldest ten years old and the youngest a babe two months, in addition to the bereaved widow.

Water Tank at Vipond Burned Down Thursday

Fire in the building at the Vipond Mine that housed the 10,000-gallon water tank on the property caused a loss of about \$2,000.00, on Thursday evening last. The building was burned to the ground and the water tank itself collapsed. The loss was covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is not known, the blaze starting in the lower part of the structure. The Vipond firemen were handicapped by the fact that their equipment was of little use when the source of their water supply was the scene of the fire and a bucket brigade was the only recourse. The Schumacher fire brigade gave valuable assistance in fighting the fire. The chief danger was from the possibility of other buildings catching fire, but the good work of the firefighters prevented this. The firemen were on guard all night to avoid danger to other buildings from flying embers. Work was commenced at once on the re-building of the tank. The work at the mine was not interfered with by the fire. It is an odd coincidence that there has been only one other fire at the Vipond that being some years ago when an ice-house was destroyed by fire.

John Murphy Injured When His House Burns

John Murphy, who has been on a farm in Mountjoy for the past ten years, had considerable ill-luck recently, the culmination being on Sunday evening when his home in Mountjoy town-burned to the ground. The fire occurred about 6:30 p.m. and could be seen from the town. The house was too far away for any help to be given in the way of fighting the fire. Mr. Murphy lived alone and had some difficulty in getting out of the burning building. The back of his sweater and his trousers were burned and he sustained some bad burns, though not seriously injured. He was brought into town and has been cared for here.

Interesting Business Discussion at Kiwanis

At the regular weekly luncheon of the Timmins Kiwanis Club on Monday there was no special speaker for the occasion but the meeting was a very interesting and pleasing one. It was chiefly a business session, a number of matters of interest being taken up and plans discussed for proposed work for the year. President J. R. Walker, presided and there were many specially attractive features to the meeting. The visitor for the day was James Graham, of Hamilton, the guest of J. D. Brady. Mr. Graham came here by train to visit but is going to ski back to Hamilton for his own pleasure.

F. A. Grant Has Collarbone Broken and Other Injuries

While at work at his duties at the Vipond Mine on Tuesday morning F. A. Grant had the ill-luck to meet with an accident that will confine him to the hospital for some weeks. He was standing on a plank when a fall of loose earth broke the plank and knocked him to the ground. He fell a distance of some seven feet; and sustained a broken collarbone, a broken shoulder and other less serious injuries with bruises. He was taken to the St. Mary's hospital where he is making the best of recovery. There will be more than the ordinary sincerity in the regret at the accident and the wishes for his early recovery, because Mr. Grant is particularly popular in town and his kindness for many years past in regularly visiting the hospital here each week and making cheerful calls on the patients has been greatly appreciated by the patients and their friends alike.

EVANGELIST REFERS TO NATIONS AND PROPHECIES
