

### TWO MATCHES PLAYED IN THE MERCANTILE LEAGUE

### FINLANDER JUMPS 2000 FEET TO DEATH IN SHAFT

John Saïomaki, Out of Work and Thought to be Penniless, Jumps to Death at Dome. Other South Porcupine and Dome News Items.

It is thought he must have climbed the high gates guarding the mouth of the shaft. He had been out of work for some time having come here from Sudbury and it is thought that despondency over being out of work and possibly out of money led to the rash act. Nothing was known of it until the body hit the roof of the cage at the 1600-foot level. The body was literally smashed to pieces. An inquest will be held on the return of Coroner Evans from Ottawa. The Finnish people say Salomaki has a wife and two children in the old country—Finland. At the time of his death no money was found on him, although he is said to have had money a few days previously.
